THE ODDFELLOWS.

The Grand Lodge of the Maritime Provinces in Session at Truro.

TRURO, N. S., Aug. 12.—The forty-first annual session of the Grand Lodge of Oddfellows of the lower provinces of British North America convened at 10 o'clock, S. T. Rogers, grand master presided. After the usual opening ceremonies the grand master delivered his annual address.

Grand Secretary J. C. P. Frazer in his report said: "The year has been one of fair progress. In some sections a very gratifying state of activity and progress is apparent. In others, though no increase of numbers appear, yet the mission of the order is being steadily and loyally pursued, and its principles are being worked out with zeal and integrity to the admiration of the communities where such work is being performed."

The total number of lodges now enrolled is 63, being an increase of two over last year. The membership last year was 4,674 and this year it is 4,853, an increase of 179. During the year 73 members withdrew by card and 32 died. Deaths average 6.72 per 1000 members.

Amount paid for relief of brothers—\$4,631.33. Amount paid for relief of widows and families—308.25. Amount paid for burying the dead—763.65. Amount paid for special relief—411.36. Total relief—\$6,114.59.

The total receipts for the year were \$25,622.03, and the total expenses were \$15,556.69. The amounts invested, etc., are: Widows and orphans' fund, \$26,556.56, and in the banks and other institutions, \$73,493.46, making an investment of \$99,490.02.

Grand Treasurer J. A. Balcom's report showed that the total amount received by him during the year was \$3,311.65, and the expenses \$2,144.63, leaving a balance of \$1,167.02.

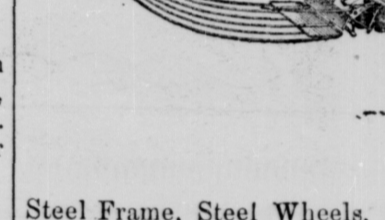
