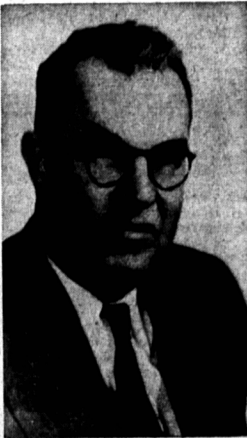

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Canadian Fire Losses Said Among Heaviest In The World

KENTVILLE, N.S. (CP)—Grims statistics during the last 10 years among the world's worst Tuesday were laid before the Canadian Association of fire chiefs in annual session here.

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The report outlined a national "crusade" to cut fire losses by putting further emphasis on fire prevention.

COAST GUARD Meanwhile three U.S. coast guard cutters are moving into the area, 100 miles northeast of Sydney, where the twin-jet B-47 was ditched about 12:30 p.m. ADT Tuesday.

"The tragedy is that most of the 647,000 fires in the decade were caused by human carelessness," the report said. "Per capita, our fire loss for the past 10 years has been one of the world's worst."

Fire chief Tom Pavling of East York Township, Ont., presented the report which said 601 Canadians died from fire during 1956, close to 1,000 were disfigured and property loss was \$115,000,000, excluding forest fire damage.

Mr. Bell said that transportation to and from Prince Edward Island has always been one of the biggest and most important problems and asserted that he was convinced that a causeway linking the island permanently with the mainland is one of the first essentials in rehabilitating the province.

"On behalf of myself and my wife," Mr. Bell said, "I desire to thank you from the bottom of my heart for what has taken place in this building. I appreciate the kindness of you all and I now feel that after working in the cause of the Conservative Government for forty years, it has been indeed worthwhile."

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The retiring leader said the financial status of the province must be viewed with grave concern. "We must accept the evident fact that the province's financial situation is not good, that our average farmer's financial standing is not as it should be and we are losing daily our young men and women to other parts of Canada," said Mr. Bell.

"I do regret that while I was leader of our truly great and famous Association, I was unable to get for you the control and administration of this province and I sincerely feel that during the past twenty years this province has not made the advancement it should have as a member of this young wealthy country of ours. In fact our province has gone back and we have a situation today that is not good for the morale of our citizens."

Mr. Diefenbaker's office said the provincial premiers, in answering the invitations, are free to suggest other matters they would like to see raised at the meeting. It could develop into a general conference forecast last week by Mr. Diefenbaker.

From a personal standpoint, Mr. Bell pledged his support and promised his previous experience and knowledge of parliamentary
