Rededication Of Dr. Bonnell's Church

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 5.—The 75-year-old Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church was rededicated Sunday to a "new era" of spiritual ministry to the people of New York.

The service of rededication marked the completion of an extensive interior renovation program that began last summer. It was also a reminder that one of New York's most revered landmarks would remain at its midtown site on the "corner of Fifth and Fifty-fifth" for many years to come.

At a cost of nearly \$150,000, the major part of which was raised in less than six weeks, the Fifth Avenue edifice now has a new copper roof, a completely redecorated main auditorium and vestibule, new red carpeting and new foam rubber damask cushions to match and a rheostat-controlled "dimmer" system that can flood the church with light at the flick of a switch.

With the sole exception of the new cushions, which have yet to be placed on the pews, the congregation saw yesterday for the first time the fruits of its giving. A dramatic touch was added to the rededication ceremonies when the pastor, the Rev. Dr. John Sutherland Bonnell, opened the service with the sentence: "And God said, let there be light, and there was light."

As his words died away the huge church auditorium became bathed in light, and the organ's muted tones swelled in a great crescendo of praise.

The service that followed was closely patterned after the order of worship used by the Rev. Dr. John Hall who preached the dedicatory sermon seventy-five years ago. An identical text was used (I Kings, 8-11), the same passages of Scripture were read, and the same hymns were sung.

Ladies' Aid Of P.E.I. Hospital Holds Meeting

At the Cundall Home, on Monday, October 2, the Senior Ladies' Aid of the Prince Edward Hospital held their first meeting since the summer recess. Twenty members were present.

Mrs. Avar, the President, presided and opened the meeting with the Lord's Prayer. The President then extended a warm welcome to all the members present and urged everyone to be prepared to work hard during the year ahead.

The minutes of the Annual Meeting and an Executive Meeting were read and adopted. Mrs. A. Leitch and Mrs. Roy Kennedy were appointed to look into the matter of a Show Case, in which to display knitted articles, at the Maternity Wing of the Hospital.

The Treasurer reported a balance of \$1,897.62 and read a list of outstanding bills amounting to \$922.42. Payment of these bills was authorized.

A motion was made appointing Mrs. A. Avar and Mrs. W. E. Cotton to represent the Aid at the Board meetings of the Trustees of the Hospital. Mrs. G. Avar, who represented the Aid at the eighth Annual Meeting of the Hospital Aids' Association, held at St. Andrews in June, gave an inspiring and interesting report of this Convention, and brought back several new ideas about raising funds.

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Literature And Life

By BOOKMAN THE LITERATURE OF JOURNALS

The literature of Journals is rich, and the reading of such publications sheds light on days that are gone. Mr. J. B. Priestly says that there are at least two kinds of such productions—One may give the picture of a man, another may give a picture of his age. I am going to look hurriedly at some half a dozen—ones which I have read and enjoyed. First, I mention "Wesley's Journal." It gives a picture of a great and very busy man, who travelled all over England, and in an age when religion had faded into formality, awakened the masses to the needs of the human soul. How he read, and even wrote, books on horseback, how he travelled and met with strange experiences—this is all revealed in these most entertaining pages. He was unfortunate in his marriage and when at length his wife left him he put the fact in Latin—"She left me, I did not send her away; I shall not recall her." The Latin shows his charity.

The Journal Intime of Amiel, translated by Mrs. Humphrey Ward, sister of Matthew Arnold, is a most interesting account of Amiel's life from 1846 until his death in 1881. Arnold has an essay on this journal and he begins by saying it is not a tonic. Readers will confirm this estimate. Amiel was a poet and a literary critic. I have always liked passage under date April 11, 1865, about the shaw?—a new gray plaid he had, it had won "kindly smiles" for him he said. He called it the only chivalrous article of dress left us now.

The Journal of Sir Walter Scott is a real tonic. He begins by saying that he had not kept a journal. He began it on Nov. 20, 1826. It closed in April, 1832 and ends with an unfinished sentence. "We slept peacefully, but the next morning..." What a picture this journal gives of a brave soul and a great worker. His whole life is steeped in pathos. His love of dogs, his affection for his man Purdy, his determination to pay off his debt, tell their own tale about the man.

Resolutions were passed dealing with problems relating to the number of monthly salary payments, sympathy in the death of Mr. Herbert Yeo and of Miss Agnes Murnaghan, thanks to the many taking part in making the convention a success, and for increased grant from P. E. I. T. F. to City cultural committee.

Because of the regrettable illness of the President, Mr. Bert Croken acted as chairman of the meeting.

I will but mention a few more—that of Jonathan Edwards. His was a massive mind. Some say probably the greatest mind this continent ever produced. The congregation of Northampton made itself infamous by the way it treated him. He became a Bachelor of Arts of Yale College before he was fourteen years old! His "seventy resolutions" are a famous document. He did not live at the time men craved a forty hour week. He worked fourteen hours a day. This is an entry from his Journal: "To esteem as some advantage, that the duties of religion are difficult! He spoke of 'starving our afflictions'—by which he means that we should not be always talking about our troubles. He was a friend of David Brainerd, whose own Journal is a classic. Dr. J. H. Jowett said that every young minister should have Brainerd's journal on the table of his bed room. Brainerd spent his life among a few Indians and thought it a privilege to be permitted to preach to them. If a man is not humiliated by reading Brainerd's pages he is hopeless.

The "autobiography" of Benjamin Franklin is the story of a great man's struggle from humble circumstances to a position of great usefulness in the world, both literary and mechanical.

Of course there, is Peppy's Diary—one of the famous products of our literature. Samuel Peppy died in 1703 and was the friend of King Charles, the second. He helped to make the British navy. How often have we smiled at his entry "so a pipe and to bed!" That was the way he often ended his entry for the day. We see him at church, commenting on the apparel of the ladies at the service. After the great fire and the plague he felt that Britain was through—that London would not be rebuilt. One would like to have the privilege of feeling as one did when he read Peppy's first.
