highways (built at the cost of impassable by-ways); none of them said a word as yet of non-permanent roads or permanent debt, or which of the two they thought the worse, or whether both would be only a curse; none called for the editor's "benediction," as if thinking it might only be an infliction! Any of these they might have had just for the asking, and wasn't it sad that never one of them ventured to ask, as if mere asking might be a task. Of all these "vital questions" nothing at all but an eloquent silence spread like a pall!

This is all they offer as exodus cure, while the tide rolls on more swift and sure. But there's one thing yet that hasn't been tried, which perhaps might stop this rolling tide. That it's well worth while anybody can see—Just turn out Bell and Johnston and Lea! Cut down the salary grab and then elect to the House more honest men who'll reduce the taxes (not grind their own axes!) nor cram their own pockets with taxpayers' dough; stop all borrowing and pay as they go. Try real, not false economy, such as practiced by Bell and Johnston and Lea.

Thus our people prospered in days of yore, they grew in numbers and wealth and store. Taxes were low and expenditures, too, and officials were few in those good days of long ago. No exodus in Premier Sullivan's day—that came with a rush when the Brits came in! Thirty years ago, and it's since gone on, a thousand a year under Liberal rule—thirty-six thousand already gone! Still they're going in scores like children to school, and the only remedy we can see is to turn out Bell and Johnston and Lea!

They languish because Russia languishes, therefore Lloyd George and those with him say that Russia must be helped.

Britain to Promote Land Settlement

MONTREAL, Que., May 21—That the government of Great Britain is now ready to cooperate with private and official agencies to the fullest extent in promoting land settlement in the British Dominion for which purpose it has already allotted the sum of one million pounds and proposes to appropriate three million pounds per year for the next fifteen years was announced by Lieut. Col. H. F. Meuring, D. S. O., M. C., prominent irrigation engineer of Vancouver upon his arrival here aboard the Canadian Pacific liner Montrose from Liverpool.

Col. Meuring who achieved distinction during the late war as commander of the 2nd Canadian Motor Machine Gun Brigade, is the head of a syndicate that is considering the purchase of 30,000 acres of land in British Columbia situated about sixty miles north of Ashcroft, where British settlers will be trained to become good Canadian farmers. The scheme involves the outlay of about six hundred thousand pounds. Colonel Meuring has spent the last 14 months in England in endeavoring to enlist the cooperation of the British government in his project. He states that he found the British government ready to lend its aid if the sanction of the Canadian government could be secured. He has the assurance that the very best type of British settlers are to be had in plenty and who are anxious to settle in Canada.

**Trans Canada Limited**

Effective May 21st, from Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver the Trans-Canada Limited train service will be re-established by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company.

This splendid train, carrying standard sleeping car equipment only and making the fastest time between terminals of any trans-continental train in America, leaves Montreal, Windsor St. Station, at 5.00 p.m., and Toronto, Union Station, at 9.00 p.m., Eastern Standard Time, daily, consuming 38 hours between Toronto and Vancouver and 32 hours between Montreal and Vancouver, also reaching Winnipeg in 41, Regina in 51 and Calgary in 65 hours.

The schedules are so arranged that train passes through all important points (commercial or tourist) at most convenient hours for entraining or detraining, and during the portion of the trip through the Canadian Rockies, open observation cars from Field to Revelstoke are special features. There is no extra charge made for this feature by Canadian Pacific.

Although this is the only deluxe train run in Canada, in which sleeping car passengers only are carried, there is no special fare required to travel on same.

**RIVER FLOODS STILL SERIOUS**

WINNIPEG May 20—The Red River is rising again after having remained stationary for several hours on Thursday. During the last twelve hours a rise of five inches has been recorded and the upward movement will likely continue for a few days, according to W. P. Brereton, City Engineer. A slight drop is reported in the river from Emerson and it is hoped the peak is passed at that point. At Brandon the Assiniboine is dropping rapidly and City Engineer Brereton believes it will not go higher in Winnipeg at present.
