A Perfect Ambuscade.

Americans Walk Right  
Into It.

BUT A BRAVE AND BRILLIANT  
CHARGE

Sent the Enemy Flying Over  
the Hills.

JARAGUA, Cuba, June 27.—The initial  
fight of Colonel Woods' rough riders and  
the troopers of the First and Tenth Regi-  
ments of cavalry will be known in history  
as the battle of La Quasina. That it did  
not end in a perfect slaughter of the  
Americans was not due to any miscalculation  
in the plan of the Spaniards, for as  
perfect an ambush as was ever formed in  
the brain of an Apache Indian was pre-  
pared, and Lieut.-Colonel Roosevelt and  
his men walked right into it.

For an hour and a half they held their  
ground amid a perfect storm of bullets  
from the front and sides, and then Colonel  
Wood to the right, and Lieut.-Colonel  
Roosevelt to the left, led a charge which  
turned the tide of battle and sent the  
enemy flying over the hills towards Sati-  
tiago.

It is now definitely known that sixteen  
men on the American side were killed,  
while 60 were wounded or are reported to  
be missing.

It is impossible to calculate the Spanish  
losses; but it is known that they were far  
heavier than those of the Americans, at  
least as regards actual loss of life.

Among the killed, are Hamilton Fish,  
jr.

**FOR GEN SHAFTER.**

General Miles Not In It.

SHAFTER CONGRATULATED BY  
THE PRESIDENT.

Will be Allowed to Conduct the Cam-  
paign to a Brilliant Conclusion.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—Mr. McKinley has  
shown his appreciation of General Shafter's  
work before Santiago in a cablegram he  
has sent him. While the text of the tele-  
gram has not been given out, it is under-  
stood that he has complimented Shafter  
on the courage of his troops and informed  
him that the honour of capturing the city  
shall rest almost wholly with him.

This action means that General Miles  
will not be sent there to share in the glory  
of the conquest. General Miles' request  
that he be sent to Santiago has been under  
the advisement of the President for several  
days, and yesterday the president gave his  
answer to the Commanding general of the  
army, and it was in the negative.

The President believes that as Shafter  
has successfully conveyed troops to Cuba  
and so bravely inaugurated the campaign,  
he ought to be allowed to conduct it to a  
brilliant conclusion.

General Miles, therefore, stays at home  
until the expedition to Porto Rico is  
ready to start, and then he will take the  
army under command.
