HARVARD WINS.—Advices from New York are to the effect that in the field and track athletics for the intercollegiate cup on Saturday, Harvard made 48 2-3 points, Yale 38, Princeton 14, Columbia 10, the College of the City of New York 1, Williams one-third of a point.

HARVARD UNIVERSITY CANADIAN CLUB.—Yesterday being the Queen's birthday, the Canadian Club held a special meeting at which the following officers were elected for the coming year: Arthur J. B. THE MARKET to-day was small with trade moderate. Eggs were scarce at 10 cents per dozen. Butter fresh sold at 19 to 21 cents per lb. and tub at 18 cents per lb. Hay sold at 55 to 60 cents per 100 lbs., with the supply small. Potatoes sold at 18 cents to wholesale buyers, the retail price averaging a few cents more per bushel.

HIS PREMONITION FULFILLED.—Martin McInerney, engineer in charge of the locomotive at the Roxboro reservoir, Philadelphia, informed one of his fellow-workmen a few days ago that he did not expect to be another day on earth, that he had a premonition that before the sun would set for the day his life would have ended. It came to him, he said, in a dream. Five hours later he fell from the locomotive and was crushed to death under the wheels.

POLICE COURT.—During the month of May, ending to-day, there were 17 convictions for drunkenness against 21 for the corresponding month of last year, 5 conviction for breach of the Lord's Day Act, 3 for disturbance of religious worship, 1 for assault, 3 for nuisance, 3 for malicious injuries to property, 1 for vagrancy, and 2 for disorderly driving. During the same period 4 summons for breach of the Lord's Day Act was dismissed, and there was also a dismissal in the case of one person charged with assault and another charged with larceny. The receipts of the court for the month amounted to \$244 21.

"ON WITH THE DANCE."—This was the spirit which prevailed over Mrs. Burris' dancing class last evening, throughout the closing exercises of the term. The children, and a few who are no longer children, danced beautifully, giving a pleasing illustration of the value of Mrs. Burris' instruction, and the use of the dance in the development of graceful action and good deportment in society. Dancing is so good and delightful a thing for the young that it is apt to be overdone. The overdoing of it is to be guarded against. But it is indisputable that "those move easiest who have learned to dance," and that Mrs. Burris is an excellent teacher.

MISTRESS OF THE SEAS.—A New York despatch says: The big steamship City of New York, flying the Jenson pennant, is mistress of the sea. She has broken all outward travel records. The vessel reached Bow Head, outside of Queenstown, at 2 a. m. on Thursday, and her proud commander, Captain Lewis, lost no time in notifying the agents of his victory. The actual time of the passage was six days and twenty minutes over a course of 2,891 1/2 miles. The average speed per hour was 21.06 sea miles. The record just made by the White Star steamship Teutonic was five days, twenty-one hours, three minutes, or an average of 19.65 sea miles an hour. Had the City of New York traversed over a course of the same length as that of the Teutonic, 2,791 miles, her actual time would have been five days, nineteen hours and five minutes. The daily runs of the City of New York were 458 miles, 467, 470, 472, 473, 475 and 81.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

House of Commons.

The Northwest School Question

The Sunday Observance Bill.

OTTAWA, May 30.

Hon. Mr. Patterson read an extract from the speech of Mr. Lister, made during the all-night sitting last week, to the effect that the Secretary of State had handled the boodle in North Perth and in the by-election. Mr. Patterson gave a flat denial to the statement, saying that he never in his life took money or used money in that or any other constituency corruptly.

Mr. Lister, in replying, evaded the question, and by insinuation intimated that while the Secretary of State did not personally take money into the counties, it was taken there.

Mr. Patterson replied that some of the references to which reference was made were now in the courts, and time would show that he was correct in the statement that he made.

Armstrong moved that his resolution asking that the Northwest Assembly be given power to legislate upon the schools and the language question in the Northwest, and argued that the question ought to be disposed of and removed from the arena of federal politics. There was a long discussion, but no vote reached.

The House went into committee on the Sunday Observance Bill. Sir John Thompson moved that the first clause in regard to Sunday newspapers be struck out. It was, he said a matter that provincial governments could deal with. O'Brien was opposed to Sunday newspapers. Mr. Davies favored the clause. Mills said that in the province of Ontario this subject was already dealt with by the Legislature. Charlton moved that the section of the clause restricting work on morning newspapers to after nine o'clock Sunday night, be struck out. White (Cardwell) was favorable to the bill to prevent Sunday papers. McLeod was opposed to voting down the clause. It should be amended in the direction of preventing the publication of Sunday newspapers. Fraser spoke on the question from a view of protecting workmen against working on Sunday. Coatsworth spoke strongly in favor of such a law as the clause proposed. Chapleau refused to be dragged into the matter by the religious zeal of Charlton. The clause was struck out. The second clause regarding canals was supplied by the Minister of Justice and took the place of the one in the bill. It provided that canals might be open up to six o'clock in the morning and after 9 o'clock at night and in case of urgent necessity at such hours as provided for by order in council. When the third clause in regard to railways was reached, Sir John Thompson said that it was ambiguous and would require to be drafted over. To permit of this he would move that the committee rise and report progress. Carried, House adjourned.

Against Home Rule.

BELFAST, May 30.

At a large meeting of Presbyterians held here, a resolution was adopted declaring that Home Rule would not be a message of peace but would impede the healing influences of recent legislation.

Conscience Money.

OTTAWA, May 30.

The Minister of Inland Revenue has received \$1,700 of conscience money from London, England. The department has no knowledge from whom the money came.

The Jackson-Slavin Fight

LONDON, May 31.

In the Jackson-Slavin fight, Slavin was knocked out in the tenth round. Slavin was badly punished.

General Telegraphic News.

TORONTO, May 29.—Fall wheat throughout Ontario has seldom been in a better condition at this time of the year than it is now, and another bountiful harvest now seems almost assured. Reports of other grain are also satisfactory, while the prospects for apples and small fruit crops were perhaps never better than they are at present.

HAMILTON, May 29.—It is believed here that there is a probability of Bishop Hamilton, of this diocese, becoming Bishop of Quebec, which position is vacant owing to the recent death of Bishop Williams. The latter came from Quebec province.

HUTCHINSON, Kan., May 29.—A terrible tornado burst over Harper on Friday evening last. Nearly all the business houses of the city were either totally destroyed or badly twisted and both the Santa Fe & Atchison and Southern depots were entirely blown away. The end was blown out of the fine school building and four churches were wrecked, while many residences were ruined. Patterson hotel was blown down and the opera house and the roller mill was destroyed. Seven deaths are reported and many are badly injured. The total loss is about \$500,000, of which the cyclone insurance is less than \$15,000. Hundreds of families are destitute and without food or shelter. Two hundred brick and wooden buildings were destroyed at Wellington and the loss there is \$500,000. Twelve dead bodies have been taken from the ruins, and many are seriously hurt. In one case a horse was found on top of a two-story house.

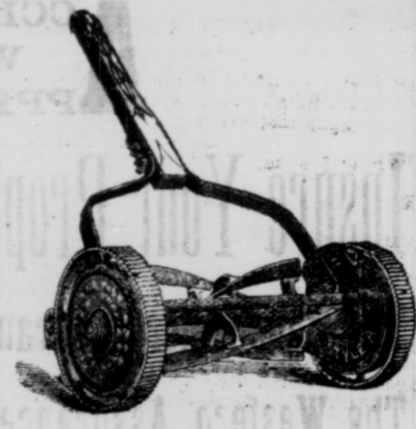
