Annual Inspection Last Night At H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte

"It is always a pleasure to come here," declared Captain A.F. Pickard, O.B.E., C.D., in an interview with the Guardian last night. Captain Pickard, who is Chief of Staff to the Flag Officer, Naval Reserve Divisions, Hamilton, Ontario, had just completed the annual inspection of the ship's company and establishment of the local Reserve Division, H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte. Highlight of the occasion was the presentation by the Inspecting Officer of the Canadian Forces Decoration to the ship's senior officer, Commander John N. Kenny. Captain Pickard's tour of inspection of reserve naval divisions began in Quebec City. Prior to his arrival here he conducted annual inspections at Montreal and St. John. The next stop on the Captain's swing through the Atlantic Provinces is scheduled for Halifax. These annual inspections are a team of the Captain asserted. A fold of experts visit each establishment a few days prior to the Inspecting Officer's arrival and examine in detail every phase of the ship's operation. Captain Pickard considered that the local naval establishment was handicapped by lack of proper facilities which limited the amount of training that could be carried out as well as the number of recruits that could be handled. The Naval Staff Officer noted with satisfaction that plans for the construction of new quarters for the Charlottetown Division were progressing favorably, observing that the location here promises to be "one of the best in the country." The naval inspection tour this year is being conducted with the aid of a naval Expediter aircraft from the Navy's Reserve Air Squadron V.C. 920, which is attached to the Toronto Naval Division. Yesterday this aircraft flew a number of flights with groups of local U.N.T.D. and Sea Cadets aboard. Commander Kenney reports that the boys "thoroughly enjoyed" this experience.

6 Burned To Death In Flash Fire Started By Fiendish Pair

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Police Friday staged a massive hunt for two men who, full of hate and booze, made human torches of five men and a woman quietly enjoying themselves in a neighborhood bar. Detectives say four men were thrown out of the bar Thursday night for forcing their attentions on a woman patron. Two of them returned in a rage and touched off a flash fire that killed six and sent three others to hospital. Arrested and booked on suspicion of murder are Clyde Bates, 26, and Oscar S. Brenhaug, 44, members of a signboard wrecking crew. Inspector Tom Reddin said witnesses "put them at the location at the time of the blast." Bates, who Reddin says has a long criminal record and Brenhaug denied knowledge of the fire. The fire occurred at 11:40 p.m. in the Club Mecca, a quiet neighborhood cocktail bar in the south central district. "HELL ON EARTH" "One moment I had a safe full of happy people having a good time. Then a sudden flash and the bar turned into a hell on earth." That was the way bartender Larry Fenton, 24, sobbingly described the tragedy to reporters. He said there was a gay crowd of nearly a score in the bar when four men came in, had a few beers, and began annoying a regular patron Mrs. Hermia Morales. One of the four was ejected. They returned and got their pal. About 40 minutes later the front door burst open. One man sloshed a pall of gasoline on the floor. Six fire companies extinguished the blaze, confining it to the tavern's interior. Mrs. Morales, the woman annoyed by the ejected quartet, was not present at the time of the fire - "wasn't I lucky?" 56 Cents Pound Top Price At Fat Stock Sale Held Friday

The T. Eaton Co. Ltd. paid 56 cents a pound for Barbour and Stewart's Grand Champion Angus steer at yesterday's fat stock sale held at the Coliseum. Milton Ford's Reserve Champion Hereford brought 31 cents per pound from Canada Packers. Livestock officials expressed themselves as well-satisfied with the sale. As one official put it, "Though the champions did not sell so high as might be expected, yet an excellent price was maintained all through the various classes." The average selling price at yesterday's sale was 24.9 cents per pound, which was reported to be nearly four cents better than the average price realized at the recent Amherst sale. A large crowd of producers, buyers, and interested spectators were on hand in the large arena yesterday afternoon to witness the sale, presided over by auctioneer Claude Craswell. He was assisted in the auctioning by Mr. Jack MacIntyre, CNR Agricultural Agent, Moncton, N.B. Ringmaster was L.W. Roper, federal livestock official who had as his aides, Messrs. Ed McGougan and Keith Clark, members of the provincial agricultural commission. Mr. Claude Paynter of the Provincial Department of Agriculture was charged with recording all the many details of the show and sale. Mr. Craswell, the auctioneer, disposed of the 93 animals offered in a little less than three and one half hours. Selling prices and buyers of the remaining top champions in each breed were as follows: Dan Jewell's Champion Shorthorn to P.L. Morris - 30 cents per pound; Eddie Clark and Frank Platt's Reserve Champion Shorthorn to the Summerside Co-op - 35 cents; Robert Sanderson's Reserve Champion Hereford (a calf entry), to Swift Canadian Co. - 30 1/2 cents; Rowell Boswell's Reserve Champion Angus to T. Eaton Co. - 26 1/2 cents; Joan Sanderson's Reserve Champion Calf entry to Melvin Ford - 27 cents.

Following the sale of his prize-winning calf club steer, Ralph Sanderson, North River, presented a cheque for one-half the proceeds to Dr. George Fisher, President of the Charlottetown Rotary Club. This donation, \$145.11, will be placed in the Rotarians fund for Crippled Children. Young Sanderson's steer brought the second highest price at yesterday's sale - 42 cents a pound. The steer was purchased by Canada Packers. Only two years ago this young man was stricken with a paralytic form of Polio. Since that time he has made rapid progress with aid of good medical and nursing attention. The lowest price paid for any animal at this sale was 20 1/2 cents.
