A CHANGE NEEDED.

SIR.—As a citizen and taxpayer who witnessed the fire at McMillan's coal depot on Tuesday afternoon and evening, I am sure that it was made clearly apparent that a change should be made in the office of Chief of the Fire Department, and I may say this opinion is also borne out by remarks made by strangers in our city, made within hearing of different people on the ground.

When business men who are heavy taxpayers unfortunately have to call for the services of the Fire Department to assist them to save their property as well as that of their neighbours who are also endangered, I submit that the Chief of that Department should use his best efforts to do his duty rather than, in reply to reasonable requests, shower the owner with abuse such as we rarely in the habit of hearing.

I think this is a state of affairs which calls on the press to take up in the interest of the public. I understand when it was necessary to sound the alarm a second time, the Marshal refused as the Chief had placed his veto on him, telling him not to do so. This looks to me like a very serious matter and may place the Corporation in a very undesirable position ere long, which will effect citizens generally more seriously than it does the Chief of the Fire Department. What right had he to call off the fireman and proceed to ring that the fire was all out when a large crowd of witnesses could plainly see and did see that it was not such a thing? And he also instructed the Marshal not to sound the alarm again.

What are the duties of the Salvage Corps, and where were they, or does such a body exist now? They were not to be seen there saving goods, and I am informed that that is what they are paid by the city for. I notice, by last evening's paper, that an alarm was again asked for yesterday morning, and again refused. Now, if this is a lawful proceeding, it is very bad for citizens who may have a fire to contend with and left to their own resources, or still worse for the corporation, which latter, I am inclined to think, will more likely be the case.
