110 ARRESTS ARE MADE

Place Damage In Montreal Parade Riots At \$100,000

MONTREAL (CP) - This violence-shaken city nursed its second riot hangover of 1955 Saturday, while citizens pondered how a students' protest parade broke into a wild rampage.
 Assistant Police Director Alfred Belanger said Friday night's riot was the worst he has seen in volatile Montreal since the anti-conscription outbreak of 1917. Belanger held 700 men ready to crack any further demonstrations.
 A three-hour procession of suspects appeared before a municipal court judge Saturday. Most youths and many wearing leather jackets—a garb that has become a symbol of youthful hooliganism hereabouts — they were charged with offences ranging from attacks on policemen to wilful damage.
 The demonstrations started as a peaceful protest parade by students against a fare increase by the Montreal Transportation Commission, but grew into a many-headed melee in which streetcars were wrecked. Some 40 persons were injured.
 Inflamed hoodlums, a mixture of many types, threw stones and bottles, wielded sticks and pulled down street signs. Streetcars were the main objects of attack, some being set afire.
 The MTC estimated damage and loss at more than \$100,000. An MTC lawyer called in municipal court "or severe" "exemplary" sentence against offenders.
 One "rester conductor reported a youth boarded his car waving a revolver. The conductor jerked the car controls violently and pitched the intruder back onto the street.

Prominent in the rioting were teen-agers, as also occurred in Montreal's last such outbreak last March 17. On that occasion the riot arose from the National League suspension of hockey idol Maurice (Rocket) Richard.
 Friday's violence, however, was much more widespread and resulted in some 110 arrests. Only 28 were arrested in the March fracas. Although Montrealers were inclined to blame the leather-jacketed youths for much of the trouble, Chief Inspector Ernest Pleau of the Montreal police force declared that the students also were far from blameless.
 "They did as much as anyone else," the inspector said.
 Older men too were in the thick of things. One of those arrested was 52 years of age.
 Police also commented bitterly that many mature theatre-goers and others encouraged the demonstrators although themselves taking no direct part in the proceedings.
