

Council Meeting Approves System

GEORGETOWN — The Town of Georgetown will proceed with the installation of a Limited Sanitary Sewage Collection System, which will serve approximately seventy percent of the Town, and tenders will be called immediately and will close on April 19th. The motion to proceed with this project was moved by Councillor James G. McConnell and seconded by Deputy Mayor J.W. Lavers at a meeting of the Town Council held in the Council Chambers on Tuesday night and presided over by Mayor Howard S. MacLean and attended by councillors, McConnell, Lavers, MacLean, Currie and Johnson.

The motion authorizes the firm of Laurie A. Coles and Associates of Charlottetown to call tenders on a Limited Sanitary Sewer Collection System, as approved by the Provincial Government Department of Municipal Affairs; the Provincial Government Department of Health and the Public Utilities Commission.

The system will serve Weeks Crescent from North Street to the lift station at the foot of Richmond Street; Kent Street from North Street to the corner of Kent and Grafton Street and then east along Grafton Street half way along the block and then cut along property lines to a man hole in the presently installed Atlantic Development System on Richmond Street; another line runs from this point west along Richmond Street to the Lift Station; a line will service the length of Water Street and one from North Street south along Victoria Street to Richmond and a line to service a proposed Trailer Park situated east of East Street, between the extensions of Grafton and Richmond Streets.

The main lines to existing properties lines on both sides of the streets serviced and will be carried across the streets by boring under the existing pavement. It will be the responsibility of the individual property holders to run a line from their base of their property line to connect with the lateral lines. It is estimated that there will be at least one hundred and twenty units that can be hooked into this system.

The tender terms will provide that the system will go through Friday and Saturday nights of next week from the hours of 5 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Six Members Visit Plant

MONTAGUE — Six members of the Shaw government made a short visit to Montague yesterday shortly after twelve noon to examine and inspect the new hockey and skating rink which is nearing completion. The rink construction began last fall and it is reported the official opening will take place sometime in June.

The artificial plant will be installed this coming fall. After the tour of the rink the party left for Georgetown where they were served dinner in the dining room of the Gulf Garden Frosted Food Plant. They then were taken on a tour of the processing area of the plant which was in full operation.

They were shown around by Jens Moe, chairman of the two plants at Georgetown, Bathurst Marine Ltd., and Gulf Garden. The manager of the plant Cyril Davis explained the operation to the six visitors who were joined by other visitors who were in the plant at the time.

All were amazed to see four steel trawlers tied up to the wharf with a reported 1/4 million pounds of fresh fish. This is possibly the largest haul of fish ever to be taken to Georgetown.

The four trawlers had been built by Bathurst Marine Ltd. The Prince County members were heard to remark well this is what we want for Prince County along with other industries and we will be as busy as they are here.

P.E.I. Society Formed Recently

The P.E.I. Chapter of the Canadian Hemophilia Society was formed on Saturday, April 2, 1966 at the Rehabilitation Centre, Charlottetown. Hemophilia is an inherited disease of the blood in which a vital clotting factor is lacking, in most cases Hemophilia is only found in males.

The election of the officers and the purposes of the society were outlined during the meeting. The officers for the ensuing year are: Cpl. Colin R. Craig, Souris, president; Ronald W. MacLean, Charlottetown, vice-president; Mrs. C.R. Craig, Souris, secretary-treasurer. A medical advisory board is to be named at a later date.

The purpose of the local chapter is to register all hemophiliacs on the Island, to enlist all sufferers, their families and friends as members of the chapter, provide medical and dental care for them, educate the sufferers and their families in the handling of their problems, dissemination of information concerning the disease to the public and raise funds to accomplish their plans.

While the blood and plasma used in the treatment of patients with this disease is supplied through the Blood Transfusion Service of the Canadian Red Cross the chapter will be dependent on other voluntary contributions for administrative expenses, support of its medical program, orthopedic work and direct aid.

All officers of the Society serve voluntarily without pay. The chapter is hoping to become affiliated with the P.E.I. Rehabilitation Council.

Special Services Are Scheduled

Roman Catholic churches in the Charlottetown area have arranged special services for Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week.

At St. Dunstan's Basilica, His Excellency Most Rev. Malcolm MacEachern, bishop of Charlottetown, will bless the Holy Oils on Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. A Mass of Concelebration will follow this Holy Thursday blessing. In the evening Masses will be celebrated at 5:15 and 7:30. The 7:30 Mass will be the special Holy Thursday Mass commemorating Christ's gift of the Holy Eucharist. A procession will follow Friday at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, the solemn liturgical service will take place. Adoration of the Cross follows the service. In the evening Mass of the Cross is scheduled for 7 o'clock.

Saturday the Easter Vigil service will commence at 11 p.m. At the service, blessings of the Easter Fire, Easter water and the Paschal Candle will take place. Solemn Pontifical Mass will follow.

Sunday service will be similar to other Sundays.

At The Church of the Most Holy Redeemer, Holy Thursday Masses are scheduled for 4 p.m., 5:30 and 7:30. The last Mass will be the special Mass for Holy Thursday. A procession honoring The Blessed Eucharist will follow this Mass. Friday the Liturgical service

Bank Case Resumed

The case of Woodrow Wheatley versus the Provincial Bank of Canada was resumed in Supreme Court before Judge R.R. Bell yesterday morning. Mr. Wheatley is suing the bank for \$100,000 for an alleged breach of contract.

Charles R. McQuaid, counsel for the defendant bank asked that the case be dismissed, this in the statement of claim no contract or no terms of contract were entered. He said there was no statement of offer or acceptance in the statement of claim and therefore no contract and that Mr. Wheatley couldn't sue. He said that Mr. Wheatley had set out nothing to be sued upon and therefore had no cause for action.

Allison Gillis and John Holmes replied on behalf of Mr. Wheatley stating that the rules of the court ask that the statement of claim be very brief and that nothing should go into the statement of claim. It was said that the contract was an oral one and consisted of the necessary parts of offer, acceptance and consideration.

Judge Bell ruled that the statement of claim submitted by the plaintiff was sufficient there by refusing Mr. McQuaid's request for dismissal on those grounds.

Mr. McQuaid completed his argument on the evidence early this afternoon and Mr. Holmes was presenting his argument when court adjourned yesterday. The case resumes today in Supreme Court and Mr. Holmes is expected to complete his argument.

Pratt Exhibition Opens At Galley

Owing to the re-scheduling, the Christopher Pratt exhibition opened yesterday at Confederation Art Gallery and will be on view until April 27th. The exhibition comprises thirty drawings and water - colours, many of from private collections, assembled by Memorial University, St. John's Newfoundland. This work is realistic and contains strong elements of magic realism.

Christopher Pratt was born in St. John's Newfoundland, on December 9th, 1935. Educated at Prince of Wales College, he went to Scotland to study fine art at the Glasgow School of Art. Returning to Canada he obtained his degree (B.F.A.) at Mount Allison University, Sackville, New Brunswick, in 1961. He accepted an appointment at Memorial University from which he resigned in 1963 to devote himself entirely to painting - and occasionally to his many and diverse interests. He is an enthusiastic fisherman, hunter and a keen observer of wild life. He is also a collector of stamps.

He lives with his family at St. Catherine's. His wife, is a painter of considerable ability herself.

Christopher Pratt was elected an Associate Member of the Royal Canadian Academy, and a Member of the Canadian Society of Graphic Arts in 1965.

His work is represented in collections of Mount Allison, Memorial and Dalhousie Universities; Confederation Centre, Charlottetown, P.E.I.; London Public Library and Art Museum, Ontario; National Gallery of Canada, New Brunswick Museum, Department of External Affairs, C.I.L., and the Royal Bank of Canada.

Premier Forwards Protest

Premier Walter Shaw has forwarded a wire to Prime Minister Pearson protesting rate increases for passengers and vehicles on the Borden ferries.

Unanimous approval was given in the Legislature to a resolution objecting to any rate increases.

"My wire," the premier said, "urged that any upward revision in ferry rates be stopped and pointed out that an increase could adversely affect our economy, particularly in the field of industry and tourism."

The premier suggested that the ferries should not be considered as a special reason for putting on additional rates - the ferries should be looked upon as being part of the Canada road system. If increases are made, a rate could be established that will also apply to the highway.

It was also suggested by the premier that an increase on the Borden service will have an effect on the Wood Islands - Carleton Place ferry service.

At one point, the premier said he thought that possibly no charges should be made for passengers and vehicles on the Borden service.

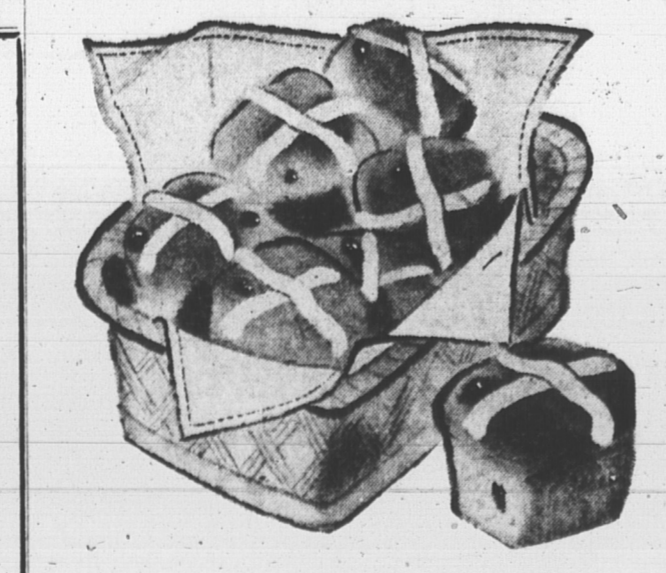
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
