(Continued from page 1) The Purresses told the visitors that their pasture field which has been out for 25 years has been the best crop this year in that time. It was mowed about 18 years ago and got little since except a good lime application. They showed a 6-acre field that pastured 10 mature cows for two weeks, as cut by the mower and was still lush yesterday they figure they'll have to cut it again soon. They're carrying 30 head of cattle, including young stock, on 25 acres. Hector Matheson, Heatherdeale has 25 head on 10 acres and his fields are showing heavy growth. He was the Kings County winner last year.

Stacia Dewar is pasturing 35 Holstein cows and 10 yearling heifers on 20 acres. He has one field that was red once in 20 years, he told the group. He has six or seven pastures, which lets the cattle graze each one for two days, and they don't come back to it again for about 12 days.

Both Mr. Kennedy and Mr. Dewar send their milk to the Montague fluid market. Sterling MacRae, Brookfield is carrying 41 cattle on 25 acres and the pasture, some on hilly soil, are lush and adequate for the herd. He is using the field of Alfalfa hay particularly increased the visitors.

Urban Gallant, Tignish, has a provincial champion in 1960 is carrying 46 head of milking Shorthorns on 26 acres and is using rotational grazing effectively.

(Continued from Page 1) In the Maritimes and Newfoundland, after a late spring with cool, cloudy and wet weather, the weather service Sunday Dominion Day weekend are expected to bring out grounds.

One of the most unusual formation days in the country will not be in the form of a celebration at all. In Newfoundland, July 1 is not a time of gladness. It was on July 1, 1916, shortly after the end of the first world war, that 75 members of the Newfoundland regiment marched from their trenches towards the German front lines. They were the only men in the world to be in the front line on that day. A day of mourning is marked each year with special religious observances and placing of wreaths on cenotaphs.
