A NUMEROUSLY signed application has been made to the Legislature, in behalf of "The Charlottetown Hospital." As the patients are nearly all persons whose houses are in the country, the application will doubtless be favorably considered by the country's representatives.

A late English paper remarks it as a peculiar fact that when the Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh were lately entertained at the British Embassy in St. Petersburg there was not a single Englishman present, the whole personnel of the Embassy being Irish.

THOUSANDS IDLE IN DENVER.—Mr. James Bain, of Moncton, has received a letter from Denver City, Colorado, in which it is stated that there are thousands of people walking the streets in that city every day, unable to obtain work or get enough money to take them out of the place. The letter also states that while so many are out of work, people continue to flock to the city at the rate of 400 per day. This is only corroborative of other reports.

OTTAWA, April 13.

The long expected decision in regard to the Canada Temperance Act has at length been given. The constitutionality of the Act has been sustained—only Judge Henry dissenting.

Senator Brown's wound is more serious than at first expected.

The Liberal net gain in Parliament is now 106 seats.

Prince Leopold has postponed his departure for Canada.

No hopes are entertained of Gortschakoff's recovery.

Dr. Wm. Sharpley, the eminent medical Professor and author, is dead, aged 78.

A formal consultation of the Liberal leaders will be held in London on Thursday.

Night Rev. Dr. Thomas Joseph Brown, Roman Catholic Bishop of Newport and Minevia, is dead, aged 82. He was consecrated in 1840.

Theodore Judin, French marine painter, is dead, aged 78.

In consequence of alarms on the Chinese frontier, the Commander of the Russian Pacific Squadron, has been recalled, and his successor will sail in a few days.

The Mexican Congress met on the 1st inst. Prest. Diaz declared foreign and domestic affairs satisfactory.

A severe gale on Lake Michigan has driven many vessels ashore.

Parnell is determined, if returned, to sit for Mayo.

Wallace Ross has applied to be allowed to pull in the race between Manlan, Courtney and Riley.
