NEWS NOTES.

A Maelbrick association is the latest
organized association among U. S. resi-
dents in London. Its object is to get Mrs.
Mayerick, the husband poisoner, out of
prison. Two successive home secretaries
refused to interfere in her case, and the
chances are that the present holder of the
office will not depart from the precedent
thus set. There is a strong prejudice in
England in favor of the idea that a jury is
a better judge of the value of evidence than
an agitator.

The Duke of Argyll, in asking the Lon-
don Times to publish the resolution unani-
mously passed at the late annual meeting
of the National Council of women of Can-
ada, and signed on its behalf by Lady
Abercrombie, expressing sympathy with the
women of Armenia, and the hope that
Providence may soon bring an end to their
sufferings and sorrows, calls attention
to the fact that it is not a memorial
petition to any government, but simply
a declaration of feeling and opinion appeal-
ing to the public sentiment which is be-
coming more and more a power in the
Christian world. He adds, on the authority
of Lady Abercrombie, that the resolution
had been signed by all the associations in
the Dominion in which women take a part
and that it represents all classes,
politics and religious creeds, Roman
Catholics and Jews and all sections of Pro-
testants.

THE SOIL'S MOISTURE
ITS ABSORPTION BY THE AIR PRE-
VENTED BY CULTIVATION.

Virtue and Value of Tillage.—Soiling the
Tillage Channels by Which the Earth's
Water Escapes. With a Table of the
Different Sections.

It is well known that cultivation pre-
vents loss of moisture, but the differ-
ence in the loss or retention of mois-
ture between a hard and compact soil
and one that has been loosened with
the plow or cultivator is greater than
may be supposed by those who have not
given their consideration. The
Professor Hubeck, of the Wisconsin
Experiment Station, found that a
piece of unplowed ground lost in seven
days in early May as much as 1,304
pounds of water per day, while in July
the loss was no more than 311 tons daily,
which was sufficient for the growth of a ton
of dry matter of corn every ten days.
The water in hard soil is brought to the
surface through capillary tubes. The
more compact the soil the finer and
more numerous these tubes, which draw
it also from the sub-soil. It is also
known as a fact that water applied to
the surface so that it does not reach
the lower roots, serves but to deprive
the roots of moisture as such water
draws more water to the surface than
that below.

DEEP TILLAGE PRESERVES MOISTURE.

The experiments made to determine
the results of deep ploughing, relation
to moisture demonstrated that
evaporation was decreased by plough-
ing. A plot that was plowed lost but
one inch of water from one foot of the
surface, while an adjoining plot that
was unplowed lost 19.89 tons. It is im-
portant, therefore, to plow early, as the
moisture made by the plow flows in the
depths below a reserve of water which
is thus checked in its progress of evap-
oration. It was demonstrated that
