MR. GUNN'S LECTURE. - It is to be regretted there was not a larger audience present last evening to hear Rev. Mr. Gunn's very interesting lecture on "Habit." Rev. Mr. Sutcliffe occupied the chair. It was very instructive and made all the more enjoyable by many amusing anecdotes. He said habit gradually became a second nature and displaced the first. Youth is the most favorable time to form either good or bad habits. He showed how training had its influence on the vegetable and animal kingdom. So also can the characters of men be moulded. Habit makes the victim unconscious of certain acts. It is not difficult to form but it is like the course of a river which may be changed but not without great labor. Men complain of business being dull and relax their industrious habits; others you can find who are ashamed to do certain work, but these very persons fall into habits that bring more shame to them than labor of any kind ever could. When God placed Adam in Eden he would have him not to loiter in idleness, but to dress and keep the soil in the condition on which we are allowed to possess the earth. We are so constituted that body, mind and spirit, have each their peculiar cravings to gratify which, when they are not satisfied, which, when they are not satisfied, state our lives would be if all the hour that now go on were stopped and men would be allowed to indulge themselves in pleasure. We would wish for the old time before the end of the year. Having nothing to do is enough to kill anyone. Economy is the guardian of property. Though a man's income be from many sources if he spends it on unnecessary, it is apt to be without the real necessities in his old age. There is a false economy, as that of a certain church goer who decided to pay no more pew rent. His son as well stayed away, formed bad habits which ruined him in the end. The habit of intemperance was well and amusingly dealt with. Total abstinence is the only safeguard from forming the habit. He showed the folly of trying to break the habit off by degrees. The tobacco habit is not so bad, but desire enough for every sensible man to desire its reform.
