CANCELLING OLD SCORES

The wise business-man balances himself open to a repetition of that injury? Not so; God can forgive us only when we repent, and if we are to forgive as we have been forgiven it can be only on the ground of the wrong-doer's repentance of the wrong he has done. Therefore, the Christian's duty is to do all that he can do to bring the one who has wronged him to repent.

Jesus puts on the injured party the responsibility for taking the first step toward a reconciliation. He says in Matthew 18:15—"If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have gained your brother." This is hard to do, but when done in Christ's spirit, it yields rich returns. The average man is only too glad to respond to such an approach. But if that should fail—and Jesus recognizes such a possibility—ask your friends to help: if they fail, appeal to the church. But do not consent to the wound remaining open. Do all that you can to heal the wound and restore the broken fellowship.

Begin the year with love. Cancel the old scores. Do not embarrass your friends any longer by requiring them to keep in mind the fact that you two are not speaking. Do not dishonor Christ by professing to accept His forgiveness while you refuse to forgive. Read and read again and again Matthew 18:15-35—every word of it. Reconciliation is the watchword of Christianity; Christ's followers live in that atmosphere forever.

—After a short illness, Mr. Everett McLeod, French River, died in the Prince County Hospital on Monday evening December 1st in his 76th year.

He was born at Park Corner, the son of the late Captain United and Mrs. McLeod, and spent all his life in that community.

He is survived by his widow, the former Johanna Stewart, four children, Frederick, Harold (Florence) Mrs. Arthur Johnson and Ethel, R. N., all of Summerside, a sister, Mrs. (Rev.) E. Lockhart, Little Shemogue, N. S. and Duncan McLeod, of Lethbridge, Alta., who visited here last summer.

His funeral was held December 4th from the Long River United Church, conducted by Rev. Mr. Haslam. Pall bearers were Andrew Bain, Heath McLeod, William Bernard, Elmer McLeod, Emerson Delaney and George Sims.

The hymns used were "Peace Perfect Peace," "Lead Kindly Light" followed by a duet "Nearer to Heaven" by Andrew Johnstone and Ernest Dunning. Burial was at the Geddie Memorial Cemetery.
