

Beavers, Millionaires Battled To Scoreless Overtime Tie Last Night

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Oct. 24 — (CP) — An overtime session of a Maritime Major Hockey League fixture left Saint John Beavers and Sydney Millionaires in a scoreless deadlock tonight.

The draw increased Saint John's lead to three points over Glace Bay Miners and Moncton Hawks, the latter having risen to a second place tie by trimming Halifax St. Mary's 4-1 tonight.

Beavers outskated and outshot the Millionaires but were unable to beat Nick Pidsodny. Spectacular was a mild term for the stonewall goalie's performance.

The pattern of all four periods was the same, with Beavers consistently outplaying the visitors only to be foiled by Nick.

For the first seven minutes Millionaires were hemmed behind their blue line. Twelve minutes elapsed before their first shot on goal. Their second—and last — shot of the session came no less than five minutes later.

Saint John passing plays led the money men going in circles. Some heavy body checking was inflicted by Matt Mesich, local defenceman.

It was again Beavers versus Pidsodny as the game proceeded. Beavers continued to play five men up. Pidsodny lost his stick once but nevertheless made two saves before he regained it.

The Beaver lines were shifted constantly, allowing no forward line to get tired. On one occasion during these shifts they had seven men on the ice and consequently received a team penalty, with captain Mesich serving it. Despite his absence the short-handed homesters still controlled the puck.

At one point George Robertson, Sydney forward, caught the whole Saint John team up the ice and raced in on Phil Hughes.

Only three minor penalties were handed out.

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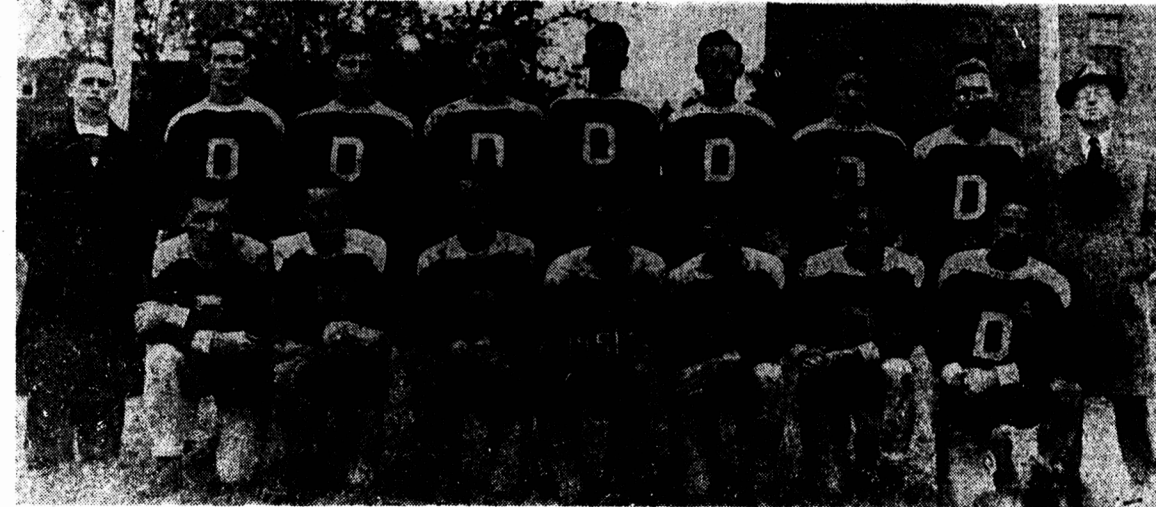

Boston Bruins In 3-1 Victory

NEW YORK, Oct. 24 — (CP) — Boston Bruins defeated New York 3-1 tonight to move into a three-way tie for third place in the National Hockey League standings. An opening night crowd of 10,737 saw the revamped Rangers remain in the league cellar, five points off the pace.

Johnny Peirson scored what turned out to be the deciding goal for Boston early in the first period while Ranger defenceman Alan Stanley was serving a penalty. Ed Sanford passed the puck to Adam Brown who fired it at the net from about 30 feet out. It deflected off Peirson's stick into an open corner.

The Rangers drew first blood and their only goal when the game was 44 seconds old. Don Raleigh lifted a short, hard one over about 15 feet in front of Sugar Jim Henry in the Bruins' nets after taking passes from Nick Miekoski and rookie defenceman Hy Buller.

Less than a minute later a pair of former Rangers teamed up to tie the game for the Bruins. Dunc Fisher passed to Hal Laycoe who was waiting in front of the New York net to make the payoff shot.

Adam Brown, in scoring the third goal for Boston, treated the New York fans to a fine one-man rush down the full length of the ice to fool New York goalie Chuck Rayner early in the third period.

The only bad feature of the game has been the number of injuries. Charlie Ready of the Abbies suffered a slight concussion last Saturday in the game with the Saints and "Copy" Callaghan had his knee badly cut in the same game. Art Perry and Jimmy Flanagan of the Abbies have been forced out of action, while Clarence and Kenny MacDonald of the senior Saints and Cliff Ready of the intermediates have been sidelined. Five P. W. C. players were hurt recently and their hospital bill was so high that some of the students who control the purse strings at the College thought that they might have to withdraw from the intercollegiate series with the second Saints.

Tonight the Islanders will make their sixth attempt to break into the win column of the M.M.H.L. Tuesday night they played a man short for a period and a half so at least "Peanuts" O'Flaherty will have to admit the Islanders know how to play defensive hockey. They spent a total of 42 minutes in the penalty box including a 10 minute misconduct sentence. In other words coach Leo Lamoureux could play whom he liked for only 18 out of the 60 minutes.

Phil Hughes was paid approximately \$8.00 for every shot he stopped last night in Saint John. According to reports Hughes receives about \$25 a week from the Beavers for four games which amounts to about \$5 a game. Against the Millionaires last night he handled only seven shots which would make each shot worth about eight bucks. It had been a long time since the Sydney Millionaires could fire only seven shots at the opposing goalie in seventy minutes.

Saints Score 5-2 Win Over U.N.B. Here In Intercollegiate Game

The Saint Dunstan's University senior football team came through with a brilliantly executed fake play yesterday afternoon to defeat the University of New Brunswick 5-2 and move into top spot in the N.B.-P.E.I. intercollegiate football series.

Rugged Phil "Scouts" Coyle scored all five points for the Saints. He got the only try of the game near the midway mark of the second half and seconds later kicked the pigskin through the uprights for the extra two points.

The try was scored on one of the smartest plays seen on a local field in years. It followed a scrum on the U. N. B. five-yard line with the Saints getting the ball. Picking quarter Pete Dunphy faked a pass to the flying quarter George Cameron. Cameron plunged through as though he were carrying the ball and deceived the defenders. Coyle cut in behind Cameron, took Dunphy's pass and plunged across the line for the game-winning points.

The two teams waged a rugged football battle which was featured by terrific backfield running and passing. Both fullbacks indulged in accurate and long distance kicking and the tackling of the two squad delighted the fans.

The victory gives Saint Dunstan's two points by virtue of one win and two ties. Mount St. is in second place with one and a half points while U. N. B. are in the cellar with a half point. The loss eliminates U. N. B. from any chance of winning the two-province crown.

Scores On Penalty Kick
Fullback Ross Shephard thwarted the Saints' attempt to whitewash the visitors as he scored two points on a long penalty kick about 12 minutes before the end of the game. The kick was made from nearly 40 yards out.

The Saints almost scored in the opening minutes of the game as Gerry Clinton raced 40 yards down the side lines. Clinton, who played the finest game of his career, made the run after a neat five man-half line play.

Play saw-sawed back and forth during the half with the Saints enjoying a slight territorial advantage. Paul Jay, who replaced the injured Kenny MacDonald, made a spectacular 50 yard run out of his own end for one of the best plays of the half while Pete Dunphy and "Scouts" Coyle paced the S. D. U. attacks.

U. N. B. nearly broke into the scoring column in the first minute of the second half as big W. Craig followed up a long kick. The ball went by fullback Joe Mallette and Craig broke into the clear with the ball about 10 yards ahead of him on the ground. He booted it across the

Freddy Driscoll played an aggressive game for the Saints in the forward line while Art Pendergast was the best tackling forward. In addition to running well, Gerry Clinton also tackled Smith so hard on one occasion that the visiting halfinner got up and limped away. Dr. Joe MacMillan was one of the busiest men on the field as his services were required at least four times.
