Weather Closes Airports, Travellers Disappointed

Dozens of Canadians hoping to get home for Christmas were disappointed and delayed up to a day as fog and inclement weather closed several airports in Eastern Canada and the United States.

Several cargo vessels were standing outside the New Brunswick port waiting for visibility to improve for docking. Low ceilings locked in the Halifax-Toronto airports for much of Thursday but Toronto's weather cleared in the evening to permit flights to take off and land. The fog was expected to linger over the coastal sections of all the Maritimes until later today.

Meanwhile, in the far West, temperatures rose slightly but 13 inches of snow which fell earlier in the week remained on the ground in Vancouver and the Fraser Valley, giving the area its first white Christmas since 1951.

Heavy fog which has hampered travel in the Maritimes since early Thursday forced closure of Saint John's airport for day, and left hundreds of Air Canada passengers stranded.

Christmas Day brought with it a slight warming trend in parts of Alberta as temperatures climbed over the zero mark for the first time in weeks.

The warmer weather, however, did not arrive before four centres, including Medicine Hat, Grande Prairie, Lethbridge and Penhold, in Alberta all but zeroed out the zero range.

STORM, FLOOD DEATHS EXCEED 40

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Flood Waters Are Threatening To Overrun Portland, Oregon

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Flood waters which in six days caused more than 40 deaths and property damage in the millions of dollars posed their greatest peril Friday night at Portland, Ore.

The business district in that city of 375,000 was in danger; its railway station was closed; its main rail and highway links to the north were cut. To the south, in storm-battered northwestern California, a U.S. aircraft carrier Bennington arrived off Eureka, Calif., with 20 mine helicopters, five destroyers and medical supplies for 1,000 patients. The helicopter was joined as many more from army, navy and private contractors to help fight the rain to aid the sick and homeless. One sought to get a doctor to a man with a broken leg.

Another warship, a destroyer, unloaded enough food in the area Friday to serve flood victims. At Portland, the swollen Willamette River, 13 feet above flood stage, threatened to breach its actual levee above the main seawall protecting the business district for more than a mile of the river's length. Only an additional concrete barrier, three feet high and six inches thick, stood between the rolling waters and Portland's downtown area.

Pope Visits Red Suburb, Prays For Paralyzed Girl

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul visited a "red bell" suburb of 30 countries Christmas Day prayed at the bedside of a girl paralyzed since she was three. The 67-year-old pontiff stopped up in his open car in the drizzle to cry "Merry Christmas" to crowds along the streets and outside the Toronto suburb, south of the city's core.

Pope Paul stopped at the home of a former nurse who had both legs cut off in an accident five years ago. He was both born to suffer," the Pope told him.

The spiritual ruler of the Roman Catholic Church, like countless priests around the world, took advantage of the night to celebrate three masses on Christmas Eve instead of the customary one.

He first, starting at the stroke of midnight, was in the presence of the Vatican's accredited diplomats from more than 30 countries. Christmas Day magnificent frescoes of Michelangelo in the Sistine Chapel.

At 8 a.m., the Pope set out, as he did last year, to celebrate Christmas mass in one of the outlying working-class districts where communism is strong.

He went to the parish church of St. Raphael the archangel in the Trullo quarter. There he addressed himself directly to the poor and the laboring class.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., (CP) — Premier Smallwood said Thursday the federal government has approved a long-sought \$50,000,000 fisheries development program for the province, providing "the biggest Christmas present in history for Newfoundland fishermen."

The premier said the program, approved by the federal cabinet Wednesday after two years of study, will be implemented during a five-year period and may eventually cost the provincial and federal governments as much as \$100,000,000.
