THE GOVERNMENT AND TEMPERANCE

DEAR SIR,—Will you permit one who is vitally interested in temperance legislation and in good government to write frankly concerning these important questions. The conduct of the Government forces during this session is without a parallel or precedent in the history of Island politics. We have waited patiently for a positive statement from Mr. Wise concerning the disgraceful *coup d'etat* of the Premier and the public at last know the conditions under which Mr. Wise took his seat. I am not a Conservative, so do not speak from a party standpoint. But as a citizen of this city I protest against such conduct on the part of an official, who was elected to office by the vote of honest men. When Mr. Farquharson was elected he represented honest men. The Government existing in this Island today is the "Rum Government." Whomade it possible for the great increase, this year, in the importation of liquor? How can the Premier tell in the Legislative hall that the License Law has curtailed the sale of liquor? What has that law done? It has simply concentrated the sale of intoxicants within certain limits and made the business respectable. They are partners now with the government. That is what they wanted. But has it decreased the sale and importation? No indeed. Since the time the License Act came into effect, there has been more liquor sold in this city than during the same period of time under any other act or law. Facts prove that the License Act is an absolute failure in the curtailment of sale of intoxicants. In the face of this the Premier poses as a temperance man. Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show advertises a two headed goat. What about the Premier? Elected by temperance people, reputed to be a temperance man, the head turns on the Government swivel another face—Le licensee the saloon! I understand a committee from the Alliance met him and presented a resolution asking for prohibition. A noble, generous and kind was his attitude toward the committee. I have succeeded in getting the substance of the resolution presented: That the temperance people of the Island (for the resolution came from the Provincial Alliance) ask the Legislature to grant a law prohibiting the sale of liquor for beverage purpose in the city of Charlottetown, and to provide for the enforcement of the same. Was that too much to ask under existing conditions? But what was the result? The burden of preparing a prohibitive bill that would not conflict with Ottawa legislation was put on the shoulders of the committee. All this would take much expense and time. What do we have legislators for? They know what public sentiment demands, and is it not their place to give us such legislation as will comply with the united request of the temperance people of the island? Public sentiment made its demand. The government said, "Prepare your bill," what nonsense! I understand the committee accepted the task. But suppose they do comply with the demand of the Premier, and present such a bill. What earnest have they that the bill will be passed? None whatever. I repeat, the Government is not for the best interests of the people; it is for the saloon. No, sir, I repudiate the charge that the people want the saloon. Dishonesty, immorality, rowdiness want the saloon—the people never! This wrong must be righted! If this Legislature fails to comply with the just demands of a sober and industrious people in this matter, then let every honest man vote for a Legislature that will. From every pulpit should come hot shot against this two-faced business. It is not politics: it is principle and right. Mr. Peters cries "Revenue," "Revenue." Has he lost all respect for the moral life blood of this city that he would barter it for "Revenue?" Would he be a human blood-sucker, the binder of misery and death? The best revenue is a sober people.
