The Civil Service.

On the 23rd February last, Dr. Muttart, M. P., moved for a Return of the Inside Division of the Civil Service by Departments, shewing: 1st. A list of employees appointed for the several Provinces comprising the Dominion, from July 1st, 1873, to the present date; also showing the proportion in which these Provinces are now represented in the Service.

2nd. A list of employees appointed from countries other than Canada since Confederation, showing the nationality of each, how long resident in Canada previous to appointment, and present salary if now in the service.

As the Dominion Government has lately appointed a Commission to enquire into the organization of the Civil Service, we wish to direct special attention to this return, especially to the first section of it, as it proves beyond question, that Prince Edward Island, up to the present, has not received her fair share of the Inside Civil Service patronage.

The table below shows, by Departments, the number of persons appointed from the several Provinces of the Dominion, respectively, from first July, 1873, to 23rd February, 1880.

Without referring specially to the second section, the return to Parliament, taken as a whole, suggests two highly important considerations that ought not to be overlooked by the Civil Service Commission. The first is the right of each Province to an equitable share of the inside Civil Service patronage; and the second is the propriety of encouraging native talent to the exclusion of foreigners. We hold that it is unfair to Canadians to have many of the best offices in the Dominion filled by old countrymen, whose presence here is due perhaps to the influence of some rich relative or influential political friend "at home." We are, of course, willing to accede equal rights and privileges—in this as well as other matters—to English, Irish and Scotchmen who come here for the purpose of making homes for themselves and of helping to build up our common country; but we are not willing that the claims of our native Canadians to positions of trust and emolument should be thrust aside merely for the accommodation of adventurers and "poor relations" from the old country.

In the Italian Chamber of Deputies on Friday, an individual in the gallery set apart for the public, flung two large stones into the hall below, but no one was hurt. The man was immediately arrested. He said he wished harm to the Chamber in general and not to any Deputy in particular. He refused to give his name, and said that later on he would state the motives which prompted the act. After again being questioned, the prisoner said his name was Godeglia; that he was a tailor at Viterbo; that he had come to Rome with the intention of killing a personal enemy or of committing suicide, but that, being desperate and tormented with hunger, he had done something for which to be arrested in order to obtain food in prison. He also alleged that some time ago he had received a commission to come to Rome to assassinate the King. Active investigation into the affair is proceeding. Godeglia is twenty-six years of age. It is believed he is insane. His pockets were found full of stones. Those he threw fell upon the ministerial bench, upon which several Deputies were sitting. They were flung with great force.

A Destructive Fire.

TWO THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS WORTH OF MILL PROPERTY DESTROYED AT CALEDONIA, LOT 61—NO INSURANCE.

On Thursday evening, June 3rd, as Kenneth Martin, Esq., of Caledonia, Lot 61, was for a short time sowing grain in a field, his attention was attracted by smoke rising in the direction of his mills. Fearing that the mills might be in danger, he immediately hastened in the direction of the fire. He did not go far before he was convinced that his fears were too well grounded to admit of doubt. He and a number of the neighbors were immediately on the scene; but the fire had already gone so far that it was impossible to arrest the progress of the flames without the mills falling victims to their fury. By the exertions of those who gathered, the mill-dam and almost all the unsawed lumber were saved. The sawed lumber destroyed amounted to about 10,000 feet, consisting chiefly of hardwood and seasoned pine, besides a large quantity of shingles. There was also a valuable set of carpenter's tools destroyed, besides several pieces of unused machinery which happened to be in the mills. The saws, consisting of three circular and four up and down saws, were bent and twisted in all shapes, rendering them utterly useless. The heavy iron shaft in the saw mill was bent and almost broken by the weight of the falling timbers. Mr. Martin estimates his loss at about \$2,500. There was no insurance on the property.—*K. C. Advertiser.*

OPIUM.

It is not a consoling fact, nor one to the credit of the British, that this vile murderer was forced on the Chinese by the aid of the bayonet and "high civilization." A few facts of the trade may be interesting: Opium is taken from India into China at the rate of 5,000 to 6,000 tons yearly. One pound of this makes 7,000 Troy grains, and a very large supply for one person's daily consumption is forty or fifty grains. Thus they have imported over 115,000,000 grains a day. For tending to do the most harm to human beings, swelling to a fearful extent the number of suicides, the professedly Christian merchants of the highest civilized nation on the earth, have received a clear profit of \$350,000,000.

Fresh difficulties in Bulgaria are feared. The Pan Slavist agitation is increasing. The Cologne Gazette says: "At a secret meeting of the Bulgarian and Roumelian leaders at Slivano, on the 29th of May, to agitate for a union of the two countries, it was resolved to prepare for active measures. The loan of £40,000 by a Bulgarian bank to East Roumelia, though pretended to be for helping the latter country pay her tribute to the Porte, is believed to be for revolutionary purposes.

On the 29th ult. Edward Hanlan was seriously ill at his residence on Toronto island. Medical attendance was called upon and, on examining the patient, said he was suffering from a severe illness of bilious fever. He is now slightly better.

One Ottawa lumber yard contains about ten million feet of lumber, nine million of which has lately been sold to American dealers at a very fair price.
