TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.)

France Refuses.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 26.

The French Government sent a note to the Sultan in which it distinctly refuses to accept the situation which will result from signing the convention and says if the convention be ratified, France will take measures necessary to protect her interests, which will be endangered by the disturbance of the equilibrium of the Mediterranean. On the other hand France offers a formal assurance that she will protect and guarantee the Sultan against whatever consequences may result if he will refuse to ratify the convention. By so doing the note says the Sultan will strengthen the ties of friendship between France and Turkey and protect his country from encroachments and ambition of England upon the receipt of this note the Council of Ministers was summoned and a note to the Powers drafted, complaining of the French interference in the international affairs of Turkey. The note will be submitted to the Sultan for his approval. It is rumored that Russian troops are advancing from Kars as a menace to Turkey.

Big Blaze in Chicago

CHICAGO, June 26.

Early this morning an employee of the Chicago Packing and Provision Company discovered a fire in the tank room, and in a few moments the tank exploded scattering the burning lard over adjacent buildings, a dozen separate fires soon competing. The fire was out this evening, fourteen and one half hours after it started. The smouldering embers continued to laden the air with the fumes of roast pork, and the five acre oven will remain on the premises red hot for two days. Loss a million and a quarter.

Yachting.

LONDON, June 26.

In the Thistle-Irex race at Glasgow Saturday, the Thistle won the prize, covering the course in 4 hours, 6 min. 45 sec. The time of the Irex was 4 hours, 18 min. 45 sec. The yacht Genesta, which is leading in the jubilee race, passed Ventnor at 10 o'clock this morning. Providing the prevailing head winds continue the Genesta will arrive about forty hours ahead of the others.

VIENNA, June 26.

King Milan, of Serbia, is visiting here as the guest of the Emperor, the latter having intimated his readiness to receive him. An important political outcome is expected to result from the conference of the sovereigns. Queen Natalie refuses to read the letters addressed to her by King Milan.

The Egyptian Convention.

LONDON, June 26.

The time set for signing the Egyptian Convention expires to-morrow. It is asserted that if the Sultan does not sign, Sir Henry Drummond Wolff's special will depart from Constantinople immediately.
