The Junior members of the Morell Poultry Club went on a tour of poultry establishments on Wednesday August 2nd. Leaving Morell village at 9:30 in three cars supplied by the Dept. of Agriculture they first journeyed through Charlottetown to the R. O. P. poultry breeding farm owned by Lloyd Burns of Freetown. There they viewed some of the finest of New Hampshire range and also the R. O. P. entry on trap in the large modern laying house. Different types of automatic waterers were examined and discussed. In the laying house they viewed trap nests, record books, more automatic waterers, different types of feeders along with other modern equipment. The brooder house with its propane gas brooders was visited as well as the R. O. P. house where individual pedigree R. O. P. stock is produced.

The next stop was at Ivan Dawson's poultry farm at Central Bedouque where Mr. Dawson was on hand to welcome the club and show them around. A beautiful flock of Banded Plymouth Rocks were shown to the visitors. Mr. Dawson also took the club members across the road to the Bedouque Chick Hatchery where he showed them through the building and explained to some extent how the hatchery worked.

From there the party continued on to Borden where they ate lunch. This they took Number 2 highway to Charlottetown and paid a visit to Swift's Chick Hatchery where the Manager, Mr. George Bunting, showed them through and explained in detail how chicks are incubated. They a treat of ice cream and cokes were donated by Swift Canadian Co. and enjoyed by all concerned.

A tour of Wheatley Bros. farm at East Royalty, where many thousands of pullets are raised annually, was the next stop. After that the party stopped for lunch at Sandy's Restaurant, Marshfield before continuing home to Morell. A WORRIED MOTHER

ANSWER: Not much, I fear, because she is convinced she knows all there is to know.

Of course, you might tell her, though she probably wouldn't listen to you, that education does not necessarily unfit a girl for society. In fact, there are those who consider that it adds to a girl's charm and attractiveness. There are even those who consider it a necessity, and that no matter how pretty a girl is she cannot interest intelligent men unless she can converse fluently and entertainingly upon cultural subjects.

You might also tell her that on this search for a husband that she is so eager to start upon a good education will be a lamp to guide her feet. For now she is so ignorant that she has no standards by which to judge men, but an education will give her a yard-stick by which to measure them.

But, as the old proverb says: "You can lead a horse to water, but you cannot make it drink." You can send a girl to college, but you cannot make her study. And if your daughter does not want to study, it is a waste of time and money to try to force an education upon her.

Wholesale Prices

OTTAWA, Aug. 3 (CP)—Wholesale prices in Canada hit an all-time high in June, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The June index was 165, up 3.2 points over May and 8.7 points over June, 1949. Since the first of the year the index has risen from 157.1.

The previous peak for the index was 164.3 registered in May, 1920.

The increase in the June index was due to marked increases in the wholesale prices of nickel, zinc, copper, steel scrap, cheese, pork and lamb carcasses, eggs, raw wool, fir timber, cedar shingles, and rolled oats. There were decreases in the prices of tallow, oranges, pepper, coconut oil, and soya bean oil.
