# Master Boing Is Winner Of \$100,000 Laurel Race

LAUREL, Md. (AP) — The tricolor of France flew high again this afternoon as Master Boing overhauled Mister Gus from the United States in the exciting victory in the fifth running of the \$100,000 Washington, D.C., International at Laurel Park.

Ten horses representing seven countries started in the gruelling mile and one half grass course classic, and the 3-year-old brown colt owned by Andre Lombard, Paris electrical equipment manufacturer, zoomed home in the sudden rainstorm to grab the \$70,000 first Monday by five lengths.

**HINDU WAND NINTH**  
Hindu Wand, the Canadian entry owned by Max Bell of Calgary, finished ninth.

Mister Gus, owned by Llangollen Farm of Liz Whitney Luna of Virginia, took second money of \$15,000 by seven lengths over Prince Cortauld, a New Zealand-bred horse representing Australia for the first time, and owned by Forest G. Smith, Jr., of Los Angeles.

C. V. Whitney's Fisherman, the 1954 winner, was fourth by a nose over Dedicate the 5-2 favorite owned by Mrs. Jan Burke of New York and Miami.

A sunny afternoon gave way to dark clouds shortly before the big global gallop started, and just six minutes before post time, as the horses paraded to the walkup start, a thunder shower struck those in the record Laurel crowd of 33,615 who were in the open scurried for cover.

Master Boing was ridden by Guy Chancellor, a 25-year-old resident of Bordeaux and the French jockey had his mount in a perfect

spot for his greatest victory. **CHURCHILL HORSE LED** — Le Pretendant, owned by Sir Winston Churchill, led after a quarter of a mile, followed by Thunder 2nd, a British horse owned by Jack Gerber of South Africa and two partners. Master Boing was third at this point, with Mister Gus fourth and the others churning the grass close behind.

By Thunder, ridden by Willie Hartack, leading U.S. jockey, sped into the lead as the horses swept past the finish line the first time. Vaquero 2nd, an Irish horse owned by Dr. Jose Herrera of Caracas, Venezuela, came up to second place, while Le Pretendant dropped back to third.

Mister Gus, ridden by Ismael Valenzuela, then burst up from third place, took the lead on the far turn with less than half a mile to go. But Master Boing was rolling by now, and he charged past the American horse in the stretch with a bit more than an eighth of a mile to go.

The winning time was 2:39 on a soft track, far off the record 2:30 4-5, set by Wilwyn, the British horse who won the first International in 1952.

Most of the crowd overlooked the French horse and he paid \$18.20, \$8.60 and \$5.20 Mister Gus the second choice at 7-2, returned at \$5.40 and \$3.60, while Prince Cortauld, a 9-2 shot, returned \$4.60 to show.

Churchill's Le Pretendant faded to finish last.

## Longden Rides \$63,100 Winner

NEW YORK (CP) — Johnny Longden, the old racing pro, came out of California to ride Lebkuchen to victory Saturday in the \$63,100 Selima Stakes at Laurel Park.

Lebkuchen, fresh from three straight wins in Kentucky, won by a nose over Smoky Veil, Magic Forest, 2-1 favorite in the 1-16 mile gallop for two-year-olds, finished last in a field of nine.

## Horses Complete Training Chores For Race Classic

LAUREL, Md. (AP) — Ten horses representing seven countries—Max Bell's Irish-bred Hindu Wand is racing for Canada—completed their training chores Sunday for the fifth running of the Washington, D.C., International at Laurel Park.

The \$100,000 invitational classic over the 1 1/2-mile grass course will be staged today with Dedicate, one of three United States contenders, the probable favorite.

Johnny Longden, the winningest jockey in the world, will ride Hindu Wand, owned by the Calgary publisher.
