

Deeper Involvement For Laos Seen In South Viet Nam War

Today's AP World Spotlight says land-locked Laos appears headed for deeper involvement in anti-Communist war. Light-heartedly describes the Italian craze for horror comic books and suggests West Germany is swinging toward reappraisal of its long opposition to recognition of the Oder-Neisse boundary with Poland.

The national weather map, broadcast each night on television, shows the Oder-Neisse territory as part of Germany.

has explosive force in Germany. But the church reported that over-all public reaction to the memorandum was positive. One prominent politician of the ruling Christian Democratic party, Wilhelm Simpfendorfer, accused his own party of dishonesty by not supporting the memorandum. He said "nobody dares to tell the German people the truth" that Poland's border cannot be moved eastward. It may take a long time before a new policy takes concrete shape.

While maintaining its claim, Bonn has officially renounced use of force to regain the territory. Pacemaker in tackling the taboo is the Protestant church. It published a memorandum that in effect advocated recognition of the Oder-Neisse boundary. The memorandum said the expulsion of millions of Germans, although violating basic ethics, was "part of the grave disaster which the German people brought upon itself and other peoples."

Part of the public reacted fiercely to the memorandum when it was overwhelmingly approved at a church synod early this month. The reaction confirmed that the problem still

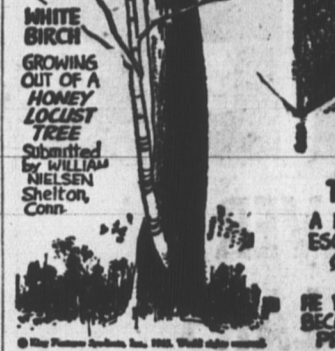
U.S. Communist Party Convicted

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Communist Party has been convicted for failure to register with the government as an agent of the Soviet Union. A U.S. district court jury of eight women and four men returned the verdict — guilty on all liberation. Judge William B. Jones imposed the maximum penalty — \$320,000 in fines.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Opening lead—six of clubs. Perfect defense sometimes requires great delicacy if the basic aim of defeating the contract is to be achieved.

Here is a case in point. West leads a club, declares playing low from dummy as East plays the queen and South and seven. When the hand was actually played, East returned a club and South had no trouble making three notrump.

He won the club with the king, led a heart to the king and ace, and later established a spade to produce nine tricks.

However, East could have defeated the contract had he led
