NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

Modus Vivendi Renewed by the Liberals.

OTTAWA, April 3.—The debate on the address was concluded yesterday afternoon and the address adopted.

Several clerks were dismissed yesterday from the Postoffice Department, and two or three from the Agricultural Department.

The estimates for next year are said to be ready, and will be brought down immediately.

An order in council has been passed renewing the modus vivendi license to fish for this year. It contains the significant statement that negotiations on trade relations and other matters between Canada and the States are still pending and therefore it is advisable to continue this arrangement for another year.

NEWFOUNDLAND FINANCES.

A Surplus Shown as a Result of Economy.

St. John's, Nfld., April 3.—The Budget presented to the Legislature of this Colony yesterday for the year ending June, 1897, shows a surplus of \$235,000. This was obtained by reducing the appropriation in all the public services. The public debt at the end of June, 1898, will be over eighteen millions.

General Rivera Shot.

NEW YORK, April 3.—A Key West special says that the news from Havana was that General Rivera was sentenced to be shot at sunrise yesterday, and it is believed that the sentence was carried out.
