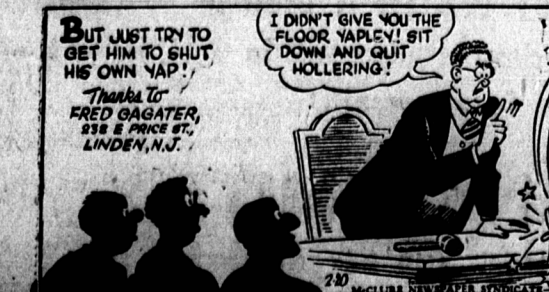

Inquest Held At Georgetown

A coroner's jury at Georgetown yesterday afternoon found that Alexander MacLellan, 42, of DeGros Marsh, came to his death on Sunday, Feb. 11 from natural causes.

The first witness was John Dan Morrison of Georgetown Royalty, a farmer. He lives alone.

He said that on Saturday, Feb. 10 MacLellan came to his home about 7:30 or 8 P. M. He had a cheque for \$51 and some cents. He wanted it cashed.

Morrison said, "I took it and went to Georgetown and got it cashed. I left MacLellan at my place. He was not there when I returned, but arrived in half an hour. I bought a bottle and a half-bottle of moonshine with \$6.00 he gave me. He also gave me \$11.00, which he owed me.

"We had several drinks. We went to a neighbour's farm house at about 9 or 9:30 P. M. and stayed about three hours. We had lunch there and returned to my house about midnight.

"MacLellan wanted to go home across the Cardigan River ice. I would not let him. He was pretty full. It did not take much effect on me. He had some in him when he first came to my place. We drank the bottle and the half bottle during the evening. MacLellan took two big drinks.

"MacLellan told me that he had

come home from the hospital two weeks ago. I told him to lie on the couch in the kitchen. He did, but then sat on the edge of the couch with his arms resting on his legs, and his head hanging down between his legs. I had taken off his rubber boots. I went to bed at 1 A. M. in the morning, leaving him in that position on the couch. He was not complaining.

"I awoke around 1 P. M. Sunday afternoon, and found MacLellan in the same position I had left him. I called to him, and felt the back of his neck. I decided he was dead. I then notified the R. C. M. P. and Dr. Kennedy and Mr. MacLellan's brothers in Newport."

Cpl. Doug George of the R. C. M. P. detachment at Montague swore to being notified by telephone on Sunday, Feb. 11th of the death of a man at Georgetown Royalty. He proceeded there with Constables Walper and Thurston. Cpl. George outlined the steps in the subsequent investigation, and told of the body being sent to Charlottetown for examination by the Provincial Pathologist.

The report of Dr. Harold Shaw, provincial pathologist said: "From the autopsy performed on the body of Alexander MacLellan of DeGros Marsh, I find the cause of death is compatible with death due to acute haemorrhagic pancreatitis possibly aggravated by a marked degree of intoxication."

The text of the jury's verdict: "We, the jury, find that Alexander MacLellan of DeGros Marsh came to his death from acute haemorrhagic pancreatitis possibly aggravated by a marked degree of intoxication."
