Commission chairman Red Sangster said yesterday that "the commission feels that the key to the whole problem is the housing survey, now being prepared under the direction of provincial town planner, Walter De Silva."

"The commission is in favor of the proposals outlined in the metropolitan committee report, but feels that Mr. De Silva's report will be a basis for making a start on the proposals."

Commenting on Summerdale clergyman's recommendation to town council that a citizens' committee be formed to deal with sub-standard housing and inadequate housing accommodation in the Summerside area, Mr. Sangster said the commission feels that it is in the mayor's interest to have a citizens' committee in any way that a mayor might consider helpful.
