Kinkora Exceeds Blood Donor Objective; Other Centres Low

Kinkora again exceeded its 120-donor objective when 152 donors attended yesterday afternoon's Red Cross blood donor clinic at Kinkora Regional High School.

Much of the credit for the excellent response is due to the splendid promotion carried out in the area under the chairmanship of Ralph McCarville with the assistance of Leslie Smith, Raymond Kelly, Raymond Smith, John Johnson, John McCabe, Clair Duffy, Bert Hamill and Lorne Arsenault.

Members of Kinkora's parish council of the Catholic Women's League once again provided the refreshments for the donors and workers, as well as volunteers to carry out other duties in connection with the clinic.

There were 96 at the expected 150 donors at the evening session held at the Legion Home in Eldon, and sponsored by the local branch of the Royal Canadian Legion with Lester MacRae as the chairman. A large marquee erected on the grounds of the Legion home was again used to advantage for the registration of the donors. Legion members, local nurses and high school students were the efficient helpers at the clinic along with representatives of the Legion Ladies' Auxiliary who looked after the refreshments for the donors.

The gain of 32 at Kinkora was outweighed by the loss of 54 at Eldon to make a net shortage of 22 on the day's quota of 270. This shortage of 22, added to Monday's deficit of 56, makes a total loss of 78 for the first two days of clinics.

Red Cross officials are in hopes that residents in the Morrell and Souris areas where clinics will be held today from 3:55 at Morell Legion home, and from 8:10 at Souris Legion home, and at Cardigan and Montague on Thursday, will turn out in large numbers to exceed their quotas and in this way make up for the deficits which have occurred at clinics held so far this week.

Pleads Not Guilty To Break At Portage Store

SUMMERSIDE—A local man, George Michael C. Kinch, pleaded not guilty to a break, entry and theft charge when he appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Court here yesterday.

The accused is charged with the break on the early morning of August 8 at Sharbell's General Store, Portage, where a safe containing a large sum of money was taken.

After the accused elected trial by judge and jury the case was adjourned to August 16 to fix a date for trial. He is represented by G. Bruce MacDonald.

Bail was set at \$5,000 in two sureties of \$2,500 each.

Donald Gordon McKenna, Tryon, and James Everett MacDonald, Maple Plains, were each sentenced to serve 30 days in jail for causing a disturbance by using obscene language.

A Summerside resident, Richard James Arsenault pleaded

guilty to a charge of carrying a concealed weapon (a knife). The case was adjourned to August 11 for sentencing.

Mrs. Cecil Bell, Mount Pleasant, was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for permitting drunkenness to take place in her residence. A second charge against the accused of keeping liquor for sale in her residence was dismissed for lack of evidence.

A Lennox Island man, James Emmett Labobe pleaded guilty to indecent assault of another male person. The accused was remanded to August 16 for sentencing.

Joseph Augustine Arsenault, Summerside, charged with having excessive weight on a vehicle, pleaded not guilty and the case was adjourned to September 7 for trial.

Joseph Edmond Perry, Miminash, pleaded guilty to separate charges of having care of control of a motor vehicle while his ability was impaired by alcohol and impaired driving. On the first charge he was assessed a fine of \$75 and costs or 15 days and on the latter \$125 and costs or 30 days.

For failing to have the registration of his vehicle transferred, Francis Joseph Perry, Kensington, was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

A speeding charge against Herbert Hardy, Mt. Pleasant was dismissed for lack of evidence.

A resident of Halifax, N.S., Robert James Palmer, was assessed a fine of \$20 and costs or 10 days for driving without due care and attention.

Joseph Earl Gaudet, Miscouche, was fined \$35 and costs or 10 days for causing a disturbance by fighting at the Miscouche Legion.

Kenneth James Ramsay, Pleasant View, pleaded guilty to separate charges of driving while his license was suspended and failing to stop when asked to do so by a police officer. The accused was fined \$50 and costs on each charge.

A Grand River resident, Robert Hudson Watte was fined \$75 and costs or 15 days for impaired driving.

John Linus MacNeill, Brooklyn, N.Y., pleaded not guilty to a similar offence and the case was set over to be heard at Alberton on a later date.

The final twilight track and field meet of the season was held last evening at the Summerside Sports complex and a strong team from Morell gave island track promoters a lot to be enthusiastic about. By far the most exciting event of the evening was a Juvenile 880 relay where Clonus Dunn of Morell came from behind to take the first place honor for the combined Kings-Queens county team.

The feature event of the evening was a relay between the three counties and here the Prince County quartet walked off with top honors.

The outstanding performances in the meet were given by two female athletes, Frances O'Connell from Morell and Jane Johnson. O'Connell won both the Juvenile 100 and 220 yard dashes and ran a very strong anchor lap for the Morell entry in the 440 relay. Johnson took the middle 100 and 220 yard events while winning her specialty, the broad jump. Bill McKinnon of Charlottetown was the other double dash winner at the meet as he took both the 100 and 220 yard dashes in the open class while winning the broad jump and placing third in the high jump which was won by the old intercollegiate record holder Dave Bernard.

A large audience viewed the meet under perfect weather conditions.
