WARD FIVE MEETING.—A meeting of the Electors of Ward No. Five was held last evening, in Mr. Philip Large's Hall, for the purpose of nominating a candidate to represent them in the City Council, in place of H. B. Smith, Esq., who has been appointed City Surveyor. Charles Heartz, Esq., was appointed chairman and the undersigned secretary. Addresses were delivered by several electors of the Ward and others, and Alex. Horae, Esq., was proposed by Benjamin Toombs, Esq., as a fit and proper person to represent Ward No. Five, in the City Council. The motion was seconded by F. W. Mitchell, Esq., and carried unanimously.—HENRY C. DEWSE, Sec'y.

A SERIOUS ACCIDENT occurred last evening at the railway crossing on the St. Peter's Road under the following circumstances:—The Eastern Train under Conductor John McDonald was coming into the city at 7.10 o'clock, and a team of two fine horses, belonging to Mr. Frederick Hardy, of Little York, was proceeding out St. Peter's Road. The train on nearing the crossing put down brakes blew the whistle, and rang the bell. The horses it is said took fright at the approaching train, dashed madly towards it, and were struck and killed by the engine. Mr. Hardy who was driving the team was slightly injured, and the sleigh was partly broken. The train stopped as quickly as possible, and Conductor McDonald returned to the road to ascertain the injuries done, and on finding that no person was seriously hurt, proceeded to the station. Another report in circulation is to the effect that the team was owned by Mr. McMillan, of Brackley Point, and when the accident occurred, the driver was in a team behind his own, but this is, we learn, incorrect.

CAPT. McPHER, of the brig "Servian," which was abandoned on the 19th ult., makes the following report:—On the 16th day of October they experienced variable and unsettled weather. At midnight a gale from south-west veered round to west-north-west and blew a heavy gale. On Monday, the 17th, severe weather continued. At ten a. m. a sea struck the ship, sweeping the decks fore and aft, throwing the ship over on her beam ends; carrying away stanchions from main to topgallant rigging. The foremast, forward house, both boats, main hatches, rudder (two seas), Joseph Asnoph and Peter McMahon, one of whom, Joseph Asnoph, was drowned) leaving the ship a complete wreck, with her ballast across her keelson.

We succeeded in getting her maintopmast, and foremast overboard, the latter breaking off below the deck, tearing away the deck as it fell. We paid out seventy-five fathoms of chain to keep her head to the wind. Then attempted to trim her ballast, but the water was so deep in her hold that but little could be done with it. All our water casks were broken and our provisions were swept overboard. The gale increased in violence during the following night and day. On the morning of the 19th the water rose about six feet above the ballast, and all our efforts to keep it down became fruitless, and the pumps would draw no water on account of the vessel being on her beam ends. The crew being without food or water for two days, were exhausted. We were discovered, at 6 a. m., by the Italian bark "Attio," who, after standing by us for 32 hours, succeeded in rescuing all hands, the vessel then being in a sinking condition. We were landed at Delaware Breakwater on the 19th inst.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

BERLIN, Nov. 24. Continuous failures of his digestive powers has enfeebled the Emperor William considerably.

SPAX, Nov. 24. The French have warned foreigners to withdraw their movable property from the country districts, otherwise such property may be destroyed in the razzias, which the approaching French columns from Kairwan and Gohes may make on the property of insurgent Arabs.

DUBLIN, Nov. 24. The Land Commissioners have issued a notice calling attention to the powers they possess to hear applications from laborers seeking to compel farmers to provide better dwellings.

It is stated that a farmer, while returning from Skibbereen fair was badly beaten and his corpse concealed.

LONDON, Nov. 24. Advice received at Constantinople state that the cholera was probably disseminated by returning pilgrims. It has appeared at Curum, Kakallah and Chehr.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 24. A disease, which is believed to be the bubonic plague, has broken out in the Witzza district of Lazistan. Five deaths therefrom have occurred in ten days. A cordon has been established and doctors have been sent.

MADRID, Nov. 24. An official telegram announces the outbreak of cholera in Alexandria.

BERLIN, Nov. 23. An official gazette says that the state of the Emperor William's health is not yet such as to warrant his leaving his room. At night he is disturbed by severe abdominal pains. He is compelled to transact only necessary Government business.

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intitled "An Act to Incorporate the Town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same."
