### Gideons To Hold Maritime Rally Here

The Gideons International in Canada are holding their 6th annual Maritime Rally at the Charlottetown Hotel September 19 to 21.

The organization, founded at Janesville, Wis., U.S.A., in 1899, first came to Canada in 1911.

Since 1908, when Scripture distribution in hotel guest rooms began, over three million Bibles and sixteen million copies of the New Testament have been placed in hotels, hospitals, schools, mental institutions and branches of the armed services. Over a million Bibles and Testaments in Canada.

In recent years the Gideon movement has spread to the British Isles, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Holland and Japan — and everywhere it is being recognized as an extended nonsectarian arm of the church, rendering a valuable spiritual service that no one denomination could perform of itself. Gideon members give lavishly of their time and financial means, and seek to gain new friends through presentation of their work in churches, where they speak by invitation just as on Sunday next many Charlottetown and district churches will welcome Gideon representatives to their pulpits.
