Mr. Wiman's Lecture.

MR. ERASTUS WIMAN—who now, like many other persons in the United States, takes a very deep interest in the future of Canada—will lecture in the Market Hall, Charlottetown, on the evening of the 27th instant: subject, "Continental Unity: how it would enlarge the opportunities of the United States, for the benefit of Canada."

Cabinet Changes.

DAME RUMOR is busy making changes in the Cabinet of Canada. Mr. Ross, of Lisgar, it is said, is to become Lieut.-Governor of Manitoba; Governor Angers is to enter the ministry upon the expiration of his term at Spencer Wood, and to be succeeded by Mr. Chapleau or Sir Adolphe Caron; Mr. Costigan is to be appointed Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick; Mr. W. R. Meredith or Mr. Clarke Wallace, or both, are to be taken into the Cabinet from Ontario, etc.

An Early Imperial Federationist.

Now that the question of Imperial Federation is coming to the front as a practical issue, the fact is recalled that the celebrated Judge Haliburton wrote strongly in favor of the scheme. The words "colonies" and "dependencies," he urged, should be discarded. "All the British possessions should be integral parts of one great whole."

He advocated Imperial Federation not only to improve the status of the colonies but also to strengthen the Empire, the position of which he picturesquely likened to a barrel without hoops or to a bundle of sticks "which must be either bound together more securely or else fall apart."

In view of these and other utterances, Judge Haliburton has long been credited with the fatherhood of the idea of Imperial Federation. But the same claim might, with equal truth, be made on behalf of Adam Smith, author of the Wealth of Nations. It has been ingeniously contended that the germ of the idea of Imperial Federation may be traced as far back as Francis Bacon. His letter to King James on the "true Greatness of the Kingdom of Great Britain," recognises the cardinal principle that the stability of a vast empire requires a reciprocity of rights, benefits and obligations among its parts.

The Stallion Race at Georgetown.

PERHAPS there could not be a better situation selected in the Maritime Provinces for a great meeting of the "kings of the turf" than Georgetown, Prince Edward Island. Almost equally near to Summerside, and New Glasgow N. S., where noted stallions are owned, and within a short distance of Charlottetown, where many princely stables have their headquarters, Georgetown offers many advantages for the grand contest that will decide which horse is to hold the championship of the Maritime Provinces during next season. The race on Tuesday, the 25th inst., is bound to rivet the attention of the breeders of the Maritime Provinces, and fortunate will be the one that captures the gold medal offered.

Whether all the horses that claim pre-eminence appear on that occasion or not, those that start can afterwards assert that they were not afraid to venture against any of their competitors. The importance of a well conducted meeting, like the one that we feel assured will take place at Georgetown, cannot be too highly estimated. Notwithstanding the fact that the price of horses is lower than for some time past, yet thousands of farmers are yearly patronizing the different sires claiming to be the best. Only last summer we saw horses from Nova Scotia coming to this Province that claimed a large service fee; and many of our breeders encouraged them. When, however, it is demonstrated in a great contest, that the stallions of this island are the peers of any in the Maritime Provinces, there will be less excuse for those who do their trading with strangers.

Encourage those who do business in your own country is the maxim that has built up Canada within the past few years; and it will apply to the horse breeding interest of this island as well as to the manufacturing industries of the Dominion. The owner of any horse who has so little enterprise as to withhold from taking part in a contest like the one to be held at Georgetown, because the purse offered is less than he would like, offers but a puerile reason for his action. We believe the horse winning first place at Georgetown will amply recompense his owner for any expenses incurred in going to that town for a day or so, not only by the money won, but by the increased patronage next season will surely bring him.

A Valuable Importation.

There arrived here a few days ago, by express, a splendid shearing Shropshire ram, purchased and imported by the Hon. D. Ferguson. This fine animal was bred by Arthur Bradburne, of Shropshire, England, for many years past winner of the principal prizes for Shropshire sheep exhibited at the Royal Agricultural Shows in England. He was imported to Ontario in August last by John Miller & Sons, of Brougham, Ontario, from whom he was obtained by Mr. Ferguson. He is exceptionally fine in point of shape, with close fleece of excellent wool close to the ground, soft black face and legs and head matchlessly covered. He is registered in the Shropshire Breeders' Flockbook of Great Britain, and also in the Shropshire Register of the United States. His weight is 250 lbs. and he cost in Ontario \$80. We congratulate Mr. Ferguson on the possession of an animal pronounced to be "the best sheep of any breed ever brought to P. E. Island."
