Simmons turned down the Phillies' first offer, but came to terms after a short meeting with club secretary George Fletcher. Last year his salary was an estimated \$17,000.

Experiment In Shipping Potatoes Gets Underway

A joint experiment by the Canadian National Railway and the Provincial Fruit and Vegetable Department was conducted yesterday for the first time in this province at three separate shipping points, Summerside, Kensington and O'Leary.
The experiment consisted of the installation of thermographs in cars of potatoes heated by charcoal burners. These thermographs are designed to register the temperature of the cars from the time they leave the shipping point until they arrive at their destination. There by checking the charts the temperature which had been registered at any given point along the route or at any given hour in transit can be ascertained.
By this method the Railway will be able to determine if sufficient heat is being provided in the reefer cars, at all points and at all times. Four of these thermographs were placed in each car shipped from the three shipping points yesterday. Telegrams were dispatched to the destination points asking that each car be checked on arrival as to the condition of the potatoes. It is found that the condition on arrival indicates that insufficient or too much heat has been provided then the railway will have the reading at all points to enable it to make the necessary adjustments. These experiments will be conducted throughout the cold season.

By sending out a signal the sonobuoy can pick up the location and path of a submarine and at the same time relay its finding to an aircraft flying nearby. The aircraft can make an attack with rockets or depth charges on both and summon surface craft to aid in the attack.
General principle of the sonobuoy was disclosed at a showing of the navy's two new planes—the Banshee jet fighter and anti-submarine S2F Grumann—but how it works remains, of course, a secret.
