Very Latest Telegrams.

London, July 5. The Austrian Government has initiated the work of disarming by leaves of absence of 36,000 men, in the standing army. The Skoptcheria or National Chamber of Servia, has passed a law excluding Prince Alexander Kasa Georgewitch and his family from all right of succession to the Throne. The regulation of the succession having been completed the Chamber adjourned. Milan was to-day consecrated and anointed at the Cathedral as the Sovereign Prince of Servia with the most imposing religious and military ceremonies.

New York, 6th. During a riot at a Fenian Picnic at Bellevue Gardens on the 4th, the police were attacked with muskets and swords by some soldiers of the fourth Fenian regiment, but the police speedily overcame them and quelled the disturbance. There were several deaths from excessive heat yesterday. The Democratic National Convention has not yet nominated a candidate for the Presidency. Gold 140.
