Alberton UC Hall Nearly Finished

ALBERTON — The building committee of Alberton United Church Hall reported at the congregational meeting Tuesday evening that the structure is nearing completion. The meeting was held in the church hall with the minister, Rev. David MacDonald, leading the worship and conducting the business. Minutes were recorded by Roy Leard who also read minutes of the last annual meeting. A verbal report from the session was given by the minister and a written one by the clerk, Mrs. A.C. Green.

In reporting for the Sunday School, Mrs. Fred Leard stated that 67 pupils were enrolled and that the school had conducted special promotion and Christmas services besides meetings in regular session on 41 Sundays.

Mrs. MacDonald reported that the Christian Fellowship has recently united with the local Presbyterian Young People's Society to form the United Presbyterian Christian Fellowship. In addition to regular meetings the group sponsored several social events. A gift of money has been pledged for the church hall which Campbell is president of the organization.

Mrs. Fred Leard, president of the United Church Women's group reported that for all the members this past year has been one of new experiences and new accomplishments in a new organization. She outlined the interesting and informative programs that have been used. The accepted allocation for mission work has been forwarded to the presbyterial treasurer, a donation has been made to the church hall and lesser amounts have been used for various local purposes.

West Pt. Ferry Committee Hopes Survey To Start Soon

The West Point Ferry Committee is hopeful that by the end of the month the preliminary survey of the ferry's feasibility will begin.

Peter MacCaull, Ellerslie, president of the West Point Ferry Company said yesterday that the provincial government has agreed to pay one-third of the cost of the survey. Mr. MacCaull said he has been advised that the Brunswick government "is certain" to pay a third also.

Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter is now in Ottawa conferring with government officials to see whether or not the federal government will pay the balance of the survey cost. Prince County MP, Dr. Orville Phillips, is also working on the project.

Mr. MacCaull suggested that a new ferry service between this province and New Brunswick will relieve much of the heavy traffic expected in 1967. It is likely that the survey will be carried out by the Toronto firm of Stevenson and Kellogg.

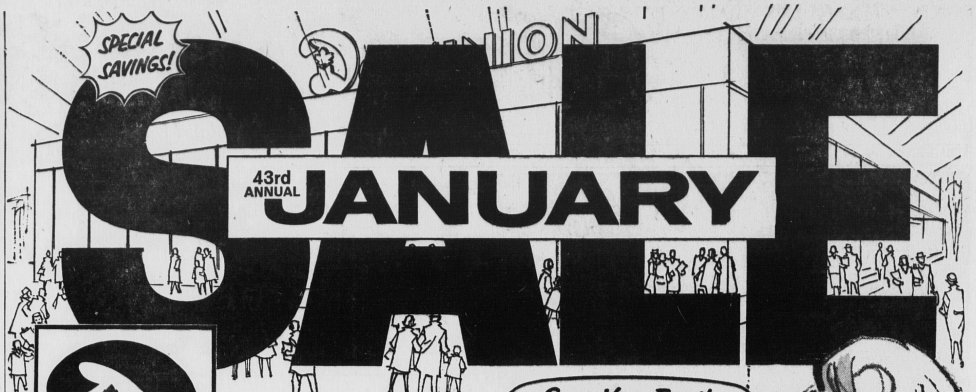
