

Farm - Labor Groups Clash As CCF Convention Closes

WINNIPEG (CP) — Despite pleas by some members for a stronger stand on socialism, the CCF party stood firm Friday on its new Winnipeg Declaration for a co-existence of private enterprise and public ownership.

Ending its 14th national convention with a hurried approval of several resolutions on party policy the CCF also had to cope with a divergence of opinion on American investment in Canada and the Canadian Labor Congress' legislative program.

Resources Minister J. H. Brockelbank of Saskatchewan led both attempts to have the convention water down its policy concerning United States "economic penetration" of Canada and supporting the 29-point program of the labor congress.

He described them as "political dynamite" in his province and, referring to American investment, a source of embarrassment in efforts to encourage investment in Saskatchewan.

SHARP CLASH

A sharp clash between labor and farm groups brought CCF leader Coldwell into convention debate for the first time during the three-day meeting. Under his urging, the convention approved the objectives of the CLC demands but not the demands themselves.

Of particular objection to agricultural delegates were union demands for representation by population and reservation of coastal and inter-coastal trade for Canadian-built vessels. The first, it was feared, would result in under-representation for rural areas; the second, increased transportation costs to western Canada by forcing foreign ships to transfer their cargoes to Canadian vessels before being shipped along the St. Lawrence seaway.

Answering charges that the CLC's program was "cutting the throat of western agriculture," Mr. Coldwell admitted some details of the union's statement needed reconsideration but said its aims are in line with CCF policy.

ESTABLISH IDENTITY

It was, Mr. Coldwell said, probably the most important resolution before the convention since it sought to establish CCF identity

CAMBRIDGE, Eng. (Reuters) Lord Boyd-Orr, former director-general of the United Nations food and agricultural organization said here Saturday if the present rate of population growth continues in 50 years there will be twice as many people in the world.

Killed In Week-End Collision In Montreal

STE. SCHOLASTIQUE, Que. (CP)—A youth and two girls were fatally injured this weekend in a two-car collision near this town 30 miles northwest of Montreal.

Killed were Barbara Chapman, 16, of St. Eustache-sur-le Lac, Que., George Kalz, 16, of Montreal, and Rhoda Piche, 16, of St. Eustache-sur-le Lac.

Miss Chapman was a promising young tennis player and last year was ranked among the top 10 in the province in the junior girls' bracket. Miss Piche was one of the cheerleaders who perform at all home games of the Montreal Alouettes of the Big Four Football League.

Kalz was killed instantly while the two girls died later in hospital.

Two other persons—David Gellatt, 19, of St. Eustache-sur-le Lac, and Yvon Dolbec, of St. Eustache—were injured.

Lt.-Governor Ends Tour Of Newfoundland Outports

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Lieutenant Governor Sir Leonard Outerbridge has arrived back in St. John's after an annual inspection tour of the outports partially disrupted by ice along the Labrador coast.

The navy frigate Outremont carrying Sir Leonard could get no further north than Cartwright, Makovik, Hopedale, Nain and Inukjuat were dropped from the itinerary.

Sir Leonard spent the extra time in the Goose Bay area. The ship brought him to Stephenville on Newfoundland's west coast Thursday before heading back to Halifax. He was met by Lt. Gen. Glen O. Barcus, commander of the U. S. Northeast Air Command, and flown back here in his private plane.

Artist Dies

WINNIPEG (CP) — Lionel LeMoine FitzGerald, 66, Canadian painter who became a member of the original "Group of Seven," died at his home here Sunday after a heart attack.

He was widely known for his watercolors and oils which hang in the National Gallery at Ottawa, the Art Gallery of Toronto and the Winnipeg and Vancouver galleries.

A native of Winnipeg and former principal of the Winnipeg School of Arts, he studied in Chicago and later at the art student's League in New York City. Although most of his work was done in Winnipeg, he also painted on the Pacific coast and in Mexico.

His earlier subjects were delicate landscapes of his native vernal hills and lakes. His last work was in the field of abstract designs on the same themes.

Because of similarities in his work he was considered an "eighth" member of the "Group of Seven"—J. D. H. Macdonald, A. Y. Jackson, Lawren Harris, Arthur Lismer, Fred Varley, Franklin Carmichael and A. C. Casson. The group later grew to nine with the addition of Edwin Holgate.
