LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

A Statement Questioned.

SIR,—I notice in your issue of the 20th inst., an account of the medical school connected with McGill College, in which your correspondent, in his gushing enthusiasm for his alma mater, states a commission was appointed by the German government to enquire into and report upon the work done in the several medical colleges on this continent, and that as a result of their investigation, McGill College was the only one found to be doing good work—that she alone was able to rank with the best German schools.

While not wishing to detract from McGill College, an institution creditable to Canada in every particular, I am compelled, in justice to myself and other graduates of American medical colleges practicing medicine on this Island, to correct the erroneous statements of your embryonic correspondent from Montreal, when he asserts that McGill is the medical school of America. I defy him to prove that a bona fide commission ever reported favorably on the merits of McGill Medical College, as contrasted with Harvard, University of Pennsylvania and other sister colleges in the United States that might be named.

His statement that McGill is equal to the best German schools is simply ridiculous. Someone, it would appear, has been preying upon the credulity of your youthful correspondent. It is to be hoped that, as he develops, his ideas may become less cramped, and that love for his particular college may not tempt him to make statements calculated to mislead the public.

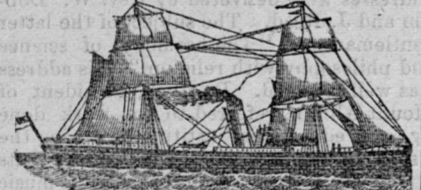
