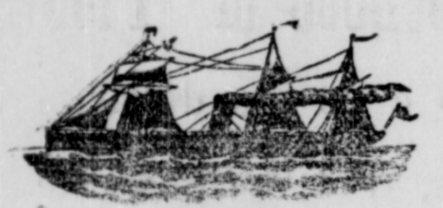

**BLACK DIAMOND LINE**

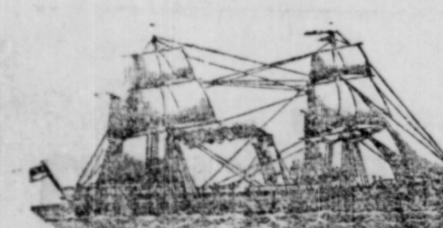

**From Yesterday's 5 o'clock Edition.**

**Key West, April 6.**—The French Transatlantic liner LaFayette, from Havre, was captured last evening while trying to enter Havana harbor with contraband of war on board.

When the LaFayette first appeared off Havana yesterday, she was warned against any attempts to enter the port. All night fall the ship made the second attempt to run the blockade and was captured.

**MADRID, May 6.**—At a Cabinet Council held yesterday afternoon, the Queen Regent presided. Premier Senor Sagasta explained the entire situation and announced the safe arrival of the steamer Alfonso XIII at Porto Rico.

The Premier also announced the opening of the Cuban Parliament.

The Queen Regent signed the war resourcel bill.

The cabinet afterwards debated the financial situation. Measures were also taken and contemplated to preserve public order.

In the disturbed localities rioting continues. At the seaport of Gijon, yesterday the fisherwomen and tobacco girls sacked several bakeries and burned all the octori factories.

**MADRID, via Paris, May 6.**—The Cuban and Porto Rico authorities have cabled that there is no need to fear the landing of American troops.

**LONDON, May 6.**—The Daily Mail's correspondent says that the want of ammunition for the Cadiz fleet caused the delay in sailing. The Cape Verde fleet will probably be compelled to return to Cadiz.

**PARIS, May 6.**—It is alleged that two iron clads, two cruisers and three transports are about to leave Cadiz to drive the Americans from Manila and then bombard the Californian ports.

**MADRID, May 6.**—The debate on the Government's policy was resumed in Congress yesterday afternoon, the sitting being mainly occupied with a continuation of Signor Robledo's speech. He severely criticized the government for its lack of foresight and after putting various questions to members of the government as to their plans he announced that he would ask the Cortes to vote an income tax.

Admiral Beráejo declined to answer a question as to the whereabouts of the Cape Verde squadron.

Senor Gullon, Minister of Foreign Affairs vigorously defended the Government's action.

**LONDON, May 6.**—A despatch to the Daily Chronicle from Cadiz, says: "The battleship Pelayo and the cruiser Alfonso XIII have left their anchorage in the Bay and gone to the dockyard. The cruiser Patriota and Rapida are preparing with all speed and are expected to sail together."

**HAVANA, May 6.**—The new Colonial Congress held its first session at noon yesterday.

The former civil governor, Jose Brusou, was elected President of the Senate and Senor Jose Manuel del Cueto, President of the Lower House.

**MADRID, May 6.**—Senor Puigceiver, Minister of Finance, announced in Congress yesterday that the official gazette will shortly publish a decree forbidding the export of wheat.

**KEY WEST, May 6.**—The conditions of the Havana blockade remain unchanged, the line being rigidly kept by the Montgomery and other cruisers under Captain Converse, who is still in temporary command.

**LONDON, May 6.**—Further news of the battle of Manila is now being received. Spanish authorities say that Admiral Dewey was entrapped by Montejó and suffered severely.

**NEW YORK, May 6.**—A despatch from Vallejo says that Admiral Kirkland has received a cypher telegram to the effect

that two hundred men were killed on the U. S. ship Baltimore at the recent battle.

**LONDON, May 6.**—Certain of the powers have again made overtures to Great Britain looking towards intervention, but the latter refuses to take any part. It is significant that the British authorities have decided to immediately commission two new battle-ships recently completed.

**WASHINGTON, May 6.**—The seizure of the French liner Lafayette raises a delicate international question. It is certain that the French will enter a protest at once.

**KEY WEST, May 6.**—There is reported to have been a mutiny on a steamer carrying U.S. troops to Cuba. It threatened to result seriously but was put down with a firm hand.

**NEW YORK, May 5.** A despatch from Madrid says riot still rages throughout Spain, and continually threatens to break into revolutionary war.

Carthegina bubbles and seethes with revolution, and troops are continually firing on angry mobs.

**LONDON, May 6.**—Great loss of life is reported during the taking of Manila.

**LONDON, May 6.**—It is believed that Admiral Sampson will attack the Canary Islands. British subjects will be removed at once.

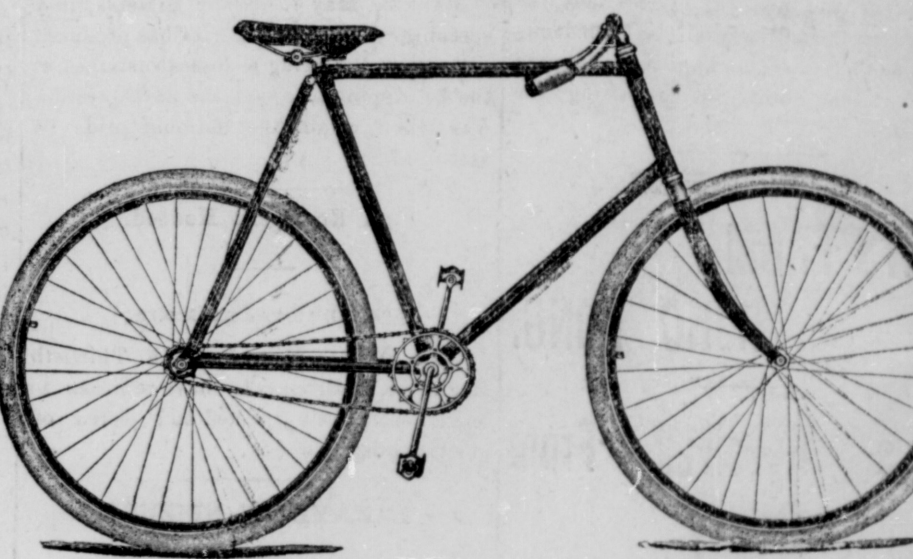

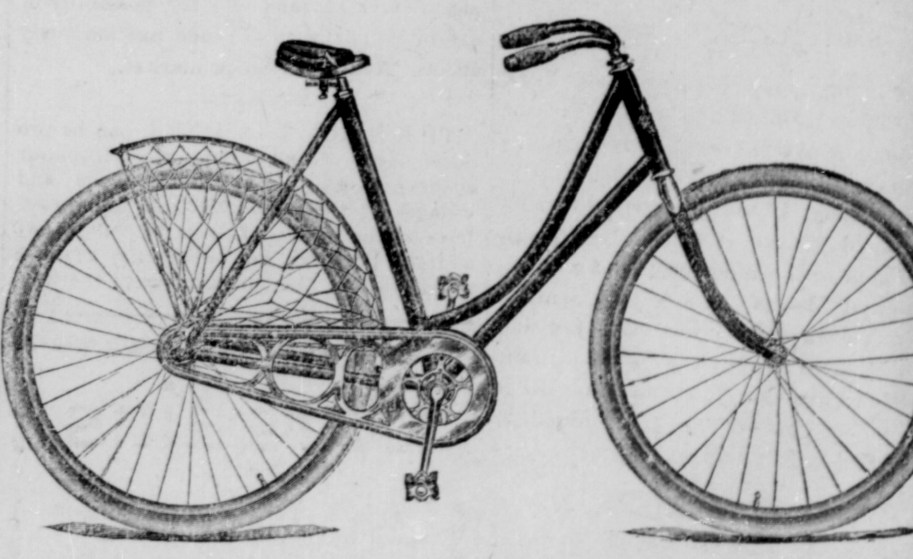
