**Drunk Situation In Ch'town Said 'Deplorable' By Mayor**

Mayor Edwin C. Johnstone, Saturday, described as "deplorable" the number of drunks seen in Charlottetown for a city of its size. The mayor praised the work of the Charlottetown Police Department but said too much time was spent arresting and convicting repeated offenders. He regretted that so little interest was shown in the resolution passed unanimously by the City Council in 1956 supporting the construction of a penal farm. The Mayor referred to the resolution as a remedy to the present situation. The Council was moved to take the resolution because dependents of persons imprisoned

for offences often depended on Council for assistance and because the offenders when released from prison often found it impossible to reestablish themselves and reverted to their old ways. Council felt that at that time if such a penal institution could be built the prisoners, while serving offences and after release, could be employed at the current wage rate until suitable employment could be found. A trade could also be learned at such an institution. Said the Mayor, "I feel that the situation will remain unsatisfactory until this small element of habitual drunkards is removed from the public's eye." Governor's Island was the suggested site for the penal colony.

**City Lodge Rededicated On Sunday**

**Safety Proposals For Fishermen Are Approved**

OTTAWA — The Board of Directors of the Fisheries Council of Canada today gave approval to two proposals to increase the protection of Canadian fishermen at sea. The discussion on safety at sea was one of several items affecting the industry from Newfoundland to British Columbia which the directors studied during their two-day meeting. Others included unemployment insurance, problems of the country's freshwater fisheries and salt fish ceilings. A number of safety proposals suggested by the Federal Department of Transport were considered. Some were temporarily shelved pending further discussion between the industry and government.

accepted. The directors gave unanimous approval of inflatable rubber dinghies for use as life saving equipment on fishing vessels and approved the proposal to paint the top of the wheelhouses of fishing vessels a bright yellow to make them more easily identifiable to search and rescue aircraft. On the subject of unemployment insurance, general satisfaction was expressed with the application generally but it was decided that a number of changes would be requested from the federal government. One of the changes to be sought involves the question of multiple deductions from a number of employers in the same week for the same fisherman. This problem now is disrupting certain seasonal operations, particularly lobster

packing. Two decisions were made affecting Canada's freshwater fisheries. That the Council would request the federal government to once again to apply the provisions of the fishermen's indemnity plan whereby the fishermen in that area would have available to them the same vessel insurance benefits as both coasts now enjoy. 2. That the Council would support the freshwater industry by requesting the federal government to initiate discussions with the provincial governments concerned whereby the federal government would play a larger part in biological and technological research in the inland areas. The directors also agreed that the Council will urge the federal government in the strongest terms to do everything possible to remove ceiling prices on salt fish in export markets. The Board meeting, before adjourning, approved the following annual meeting sites: Ottawa in 1959, Vancouver in 1960, Toronto in 1961 and Quebec City in 1962.
