Master Penmen Hope To Improve Handwriting

OTTAWA, (CP) — In flawless handwriting, the International Association of Master Penmen and Teachers of Handwriting reported Wednesday that its members are out to improve people's mastery of the pen. And they're going to start at the source with the school teacher and pupil.
The penmen, among them internationally-known handwriting experts from Canada and the United States, have just concluded a two-week annual meeting at Lindsay, Ont. Substituting a clearly-lined report for the printed form, Fred Richardson of Ottawa, the secretary, says this is what the members decided:
1. Handwriting should be taught for a minimum of 100 hours in teacher-training colleges, normal schools, universities and business colleges.
2. Handwriting should be taught in daily periods at private, public and separate schools.
3. The three Rs, reading, writing and arithmetic, should be returned to Ontario's education system.
4. In text books showing samples of handwriting, the penman's name also should be given.
H. J. Walter, a former Winnipeg teacher now living in Chicago, spoke on some of the criminal cases in which he was an expert witness, including the Lindbergh kidnaping. Mr. Walter also had worked on cases involving Al Capone and is consulted by the R. C. M. P.

Next Week Important In Major League Race

NEW YORK, (AP) — It's back to the grindstone Thursday for the major league baseball clubs, and the next seven days may be big ones in deciding whether we're in for another Yankee-Dodger sub-way World Series.
New York Yankees, now found human through their recent nine-game losing streak, move west where they have an important double-header Sunday with the red-hot Chicago White Sox, followed by three games with Cleveland Indians.
If Casey Stengel's Athletics can protect all or most of their five-game lead, there may be no head-stretch. If the Sox and Indians can cut into the advantage, the American League may be in for a crackerjack race.
In the National, the unsteady Brooklyn Dodgers, holding a 1½-game edge over second-place Milwaukee Braves, entertain St. Louis Cardinals in four games, beginning tonight. New week-end they tackle the Braves four times at Ebbets Field.
These activities, plus the doings of New York Giants and Philadelphia Phillies, should bring the senior circuit scramble into sharper focus. Only 6½ games separate the leading Dodgers from the fifth-place Giants, who have won eight of their last nine games. The Yankees have four games with the next-to-last Browns before moving into Comiskey Park where they're apt to run into a hornet's nest with the White Sox. The Sox have won 23 of their 31 contests in the last month and have moved from fifth place to second. They are only five games back of the Yankees and have a 12-game home stand with the Senators, Yankees, Red Sox and Athletics.
The Indians, in third place 8½ games behind the Yankees, have three games with the Athletics and a Sunday doubleheader with Boston Red Sox before entertaining the world champions next Tuesday.
The Dodgers are showing more concern for their inter-borough rivals, the Giants, who now are getting the best pitching in the National League.
The Dodgers probably find it hard to forget that the Giants wiped out a 13½-game Brooklyn lead two years ago and went on to win the pennant in a playoff.
While the Dodgers are playing the Cards, the Braves will meet the lowly Pirates in three games at Pittsburgh. They follow this with a double-header against the Giants Sunday and four important games with the Phillies at Philadelphia.
The Phils and Cards are virtually tied for third four games back. The Phils have four games with Cincinnati before a Sunday doubleheader with Chicago Cubs.

Rochon suffered the injury to his right leg in practice Monday. It was thought a day's rest would permit him to resume workouts today.

Roberts Ahead Of Last Year's Record Pace

NEW YORK, (AP) — Robin Roberts, the Philadelphia Phillies' fabulous righthander, is ahead of the pace that brought him a blazing 23-7 pitching record last year.
At the nominal halfway point in the major league season Roberts has a record of 14 victories and six defeats compared to 11 wins and six losses at the same time in 1952.
What is happening to the five other 20-game winners of last year? They were Early Wynn (23-12), Bob Lemon (22-11) and Mike Garcia (22-11), all of Cleveland. Allie Reynolds (20-8) of New York Yankees and lefty Bobby Shantz (24-7) of Philadelphia.
Cleveland's big three is on approximately the same timetable as 1952. Garcia, currently 10-6, was 11-6 at this time a year ago. Wynn is 9-6 compared to 9-7. But Lemon stands 11-8 against 7-7 a year ago.
Reynolds, who has run into some trouble as a starter but who has seen yeoman duty as a reliever so far this year, has won eight and lost five to date. Last year he had a 10-4 record.
Hard-luck Shantz, who has injured and re-injured his pitching arm this year, has a meagre 3-6 showing compared to a sensational 14-3 a year ago when he was the league's most valuable player.
