## Annual Meeting Of Old Protestant Cemetery Trustees

The annual meeting of the trustees of the old Protestant Cemetery on Elm Avenue was held Thursday afternoon in the Provincial Building.  
In the unavoidable absence of Mr. W. A. Stewart, Major T. E. MacNutt occupied the chair.  
The minutes of the meeting held January 27th, 1955 were read and upon motion adopted.  
The treasurer's report was read, showing a small balance on hand, and this report was also adopted.  
It was pointed out by the treasurer that the annual income from the several contributing Protestant churches is not sufficient to cover yearly current expenses, and it was suggested that each contributing church be asked to increase its amount by at least \$5.00 yearly. This suggestion was upon motion adopted.  
The treasurer reported that the Centennial Committee of the City had contributed the sum of \$75.00 toward the expense of cutting down trees, taking out old stumps, and generally cleaning up the Cemetery, and making it attractive and presentable to tourists and others for Centennial year. The total expense was \$11.00, or an additional amount of \$64.00 was paid out of current revenue. This action by the Centennial Committee was much appreciated by the trustees.  
The treasurer and secretary had earlier visited the Cemetery and found it in good condition. Some graves and branches in the driveway will be burned or removed, also sections of a birch tree cut down will also be removed.  
The matter of having the fences painted was discussed, but no action was taken.  
Our caretaker is to be commended for his faithful work done during the past year.  
The following officers were re-appointed for the ensuing year: Chairman, W. A. Stewart, Treasurer, G. E. Proctor, and Secretary C. H. Black.

## Large Entry List In Live Fox & Mink Show

A large entry is assured for the 25th anniversary Live Fox Show and the 8th annual Live Mink Show, which is to be held in the fur pavilion at the Provincial Exhibition grounds from Nov. 28 to Dec. 2.  
Classes to be shown in foxes are: Mediums; Light medium silvers; Light silvers; Extra light silvers; Standard pearl platinum in the medium, light and extra light classes, and standard platinum mediums. Those to be shown in the mink are: White, Patinum, Stewart platinum and Breath of Spring (Light and medium); High Sapphires (Light and medium); Sapphires (Light and medium); Pastel Breath of Spring; Pastel Breath of Spring and Stewart (Medium and Light); Aleutinas, and Standard (Natural dark).  
The Province is the only area that can boast of having a live fox exhibition to celebrate its 25th anniversary. Since the first show held in 1929 only one year's show was missed, due to distemper in the Province.  
While fox prices have not shown improvement to the present, it is hoped the next twelve months will see an upward trend. Stale goods on hand are being depleted and fresh ranches fox skins will be available a year hence. This coupled with added scarcity should improve prices.  
In the case of the mink ranches they are enjoying good prices for good quality pelts of all types, and the outlook remains bright. From a quality standpoint Mink ranching in the Province has shown steady improvement, with few costs quite reasonable.  
The Provincial Government has indicated its intention to keep in touch with, and to render practical assistance to this important fur breeding industry.

**Denounces Fear Complex In Quebec**  
QUEBEC (CP)-A Liberal member of the Quebec upper house said Thursday the Quebec government is attempting "to set up Quebec as a reserve where we can live in our own little world."  
And, said "71-year-old Elise Theriault, "I am sick of it."  
Mr. Theriault, who sits for the division of Kennebec, made the remarks in the Legislative Council during the three speech debate.  
"I am sick and tired of the fear complex which has been encouraged among the French-Canadians of Quebec province," he said.  
"All we have been hearing in recent years is that we in Quebec are threatened with the loss of our rights and our privileges."  
"I have always believed that I am a citizen of the Dominion of Canada and that I am equally at home in Ontario and British Columbia as I am in my own province," he said.  
The French-speaking residents of New Brunswick had no fear of losing their privileges because no fear complex had been aroused among them.
