IN MEMORIAM

ALLAN MORRISON

On the morning of January 12th last, he departed from this life one of Prince Edward Island's oldest residents in the person of Allan Morrison of Savage Harbour at the age of ninety-four years.

To comparatively few are given so many years of life; to fewer still the gift of health enjoyed to the full through the years of youth, of maturity and in proportionate measure during the evening of life, as was accorded the above deceased, so that but a few days' illness intervened between his usual routine of life with his family and neighbours and that when he answered God's summons to depart from this life.

The late Mr. Morrison could be eulogized to great length, but many words are not necessary, since one can say of him that he gave unstintingly of himself to his home, his neighbors, his school and his parish, sharing himself with all to the best of his ability as the need arose.

He was a man of great faith, faithfully and without question so discharged it.

With the exception of some time spent in the New England States and following the sea, as a young man, he lived his entire life in Savage Harbour, the district where in he was born and to which he was deeply attached.

He was a prolific reader and a keen debater, a lover of company both in his own home, where he was always the friendly host, and in the homes of his neighbors.

He was the son of Donald Morrison and Elizabeth Campbell and the eldest but one of a large family. Of that family three entered the priesthood. Rev. James Morrison, late Bishop of Antigonish, the late Very Rev. D. F. X. Morrison, D.D., and the late Rev. Vincent Morrison, S.F.M. One brother, John A., of New York still survives.

Sixty years ago he married Mary MacDonald of Allisary and to that union were born eight children, four of whom predeceased him. Left to mourn his loss besides his widow are his sons, James, Charles, Cyril and John; also two grandchildren, George and Mary. They mourn his loss but cherish his memory, and respect the example he set of a life well and fully lived here on earth as a preparation for the life hereafter.

On Thursday, January 15th, a very large number of neighbors and friends followed in procession his remains from his home to St. Andrew's Church, where solemn High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by his pastor, Reverend George MacCormac, with Rev. W. V. MacDonald as deacon, Rev. George MacDonald, St. Dunstan's University as sub-deacon, and the Rev. Phalen MacKenna, master of ceremonies.

Present also in the Sanctuary were Rev. Terrence Campbell, Monsignor R. V. MacKenna, Rev. Leonard Ayres, Rev. Farrell Wood and Rev. George MacDonald of St. Margarets. Rev. Basil Croken and Rev. Lawrence Landrigan assisted in the choir. Service at the grave was conducted by Rev. George MacCormac.

Evening Grosbeaks Call Briefly In Georgetown

Among all the interesting stories of robins and snakes making their appearance recently, and pannies blooming at this very early season of the year; it is worthy of note that during a recent mild spell in the first week of February, seven or eight Evening Grosbeaks spent a day or so in the trees and around the gardens of Georgetown.

The Evening Grosbeak is about the size of a robin, and just as striking-looking with his yellow breast and black and white wings. Their Canadian breeding-grounds are in Central British Columbia, and they are mentioned in official bird guides as wintering as far as New England. It is mentioned however, that some of these birds have been observed for four or five years locally, and the usual time of their brief appearance here, for two or three days, has always been during the first week of March.

This year they were a whole month early. But whether this presages an early spring, or whether they were merely fleeing ahead of some particularly violent storms, time alone will tell.
