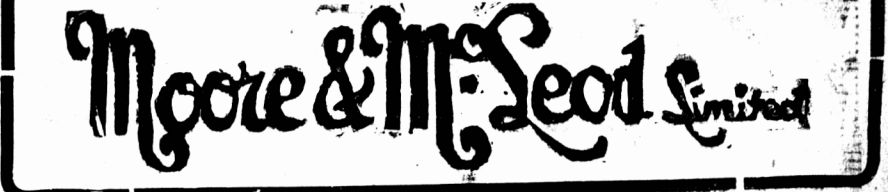

Fears U. S. May Become Arid Land

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
EVANSTON, Ill., July 1.—Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace paused in his tour of the United States tonight to reveal a fear of a possible "weather change" which might make the United States an arid land.

Threats of the "change" were carried in the long, dry spells of 1954 and 1956, and in otherwise "freakish" weather of the past seven years, the Secretary asserted.

After describing the present lack of rainfall as "almost as bad" as the disaster of two years ago, the director of the new deal's farm program said it is premature to say that our weather has definitely changed but if we have during the next seven years weather as freakish as that which we have had during the past seven, it may well be that the people of the United States will call on the Federal Government in no unmistakable terms to aid them in making certain profound adjustments.

Milling Industry Better This Year

TORONTO, July 2—(C. P.) — Both in exports and domestic sales the Canadian flour milling business is experiencing some improvement this year over last and in the meantime overhead costs have come down, according to unofficial forecasts, based mainly on the recent popularity of milling stocks among market traders.

The big "if" for the milling companies is the export market. If that develops satisfactorily, as the stock quotations appear to anticipate, the prosperity enjoyed in 1929 when exports reached 11,000,000 barrels may again become a reality.

Continental European mills have developed at Canada's expense, says The Financial Post, and a re-juvenated British milling industry is becoming increasingly competitive with Canada in Scandinavian countries. Newfoundland and the West Indies have also been a factor. Due to the Ottawa agreement whereby Canada gained a preference in the British market the American export of around 1,000,000 barrels per year has been practically cut off.

Canadian mills have little immediate hope of doubling present overseas trade. However, as a result of the economic made during the most trying period the milling industry in this country has ever experienced, they claim that such would not be necessary. Another 2,000,000 barrels added to the present export trade, it is estimated, should put them back on a really profitable basis again.

Her passing, at the comparatively early age of sixty leaves a great vacancy in the home and community. Mrs. Taylor was formerly Sophia Burdett, daughter of the late Thomas and Mary Burdett of Fairview. Not being in good health, she decided a visit to her sister, Mrs. James Smith. While there she became seriously ill. Realizing her illness was beyond human aid, she commended her spirit to God and put her trust in Him, bearing her cross with great patience, comforted to the end by visits from Rev. Carlyle Webster, Rev. D. K. Ross, and Rev. James Robertson.

There are left to mourn, a sorrowing husband, three sons, Gordon and Raymond at home, Stanley at Fairview; also two daughters, Mrs. Alex. Strang at New Dominion, Mrs. G. A. Smith at Charlottetown, B.C.; also two sisters and six brothers.

Fair Art Expert on Museum Tour

MONTREAL, July 1—(C.P.) — Monique Loo is regarded by museums as one of the world's great authorities on Chinese art. Monique Loo, who recently arrived in New York, after completing a world tour of museums of oriental art, is no bewildered dour-looking old gentleman with a magnifying glass—but a lovely, fragile, soft-spoken girl, says The Gazette.

She is the daughter of a Chinese father and a Parisian mother, so she comes by her talents honestly. Her father is a well-known dealer in Chinese painting and sculpture.

As a little girl Monique Loo was permitted to dust her father's studio. In coming on a Chinese vase one day something stirred in her. To use her own words: "I had the feeling then I began to understand art, that perhaps something inside me had been sleeping. Suddenly, like a flower it opened." And that was the beginning of many years of study, and the cause of a world-wide hegria of Chinese art collections all over the world.

Photographers' Assn. Meets

AMHERST, N. S., July 1.—R. H. Smith of Amherst, was elected president of the Maritime Professional Photographers' Association, at one of the largest meetings in its history here today. WILL EXTEND BBC CHARTER

Development Of Empire Broadcasting Is Urged.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
LONDON, July 2—(C. P. Cable)—Following the recommendations of a special committee on broadcasting, it was announced tonight that the government would extend the charter of the British Broadcasting Corporation for 13 years from Dec. 31 next, increase the number of governors from seven to ten and increase the corporation's share of revenue from public receiving licenses.

Cost of such licenses will remain at 10 shillings.

The government held the view that the corporation should continue to refrain from commenting upon current affairs, both in broadcasts and in the corporation's own publications.

It approved the suggestion of the committee—which submitted its report last March—that Empire broadcasting service should be developed. It also held that the licensing of relay stations should be continued for another three years, the postmaster-general being empowered to take over the relay afterwards.

The government also approved the continued exclusion of advertisements and believed the responsible departments should take all possible steps to prevent the broadcasting of foreign advertisement programs.

Noted Fishing Skipper Dies

HYANNIS, Mass., July 1—Gloucester's widely-known racing fishing skipper, Captain Clayton E. Morrissey, 62, died today at the Cape Cod Hospital from heart disease.

He was stricken while fishing in his small boat, the Numbus, early today.

A native of Pabodie, N. S., Morrissey moved to Gloucester in his early thirties.

16 Drowned In South Texas Flood

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)
SAN ANTONIO, Texas, July 1.—Sixteen persons were drowned and 12 others were missing tonight as raging South Texas flood waters laid waste a wide area.

The latest casualties were four members of a prominent family near Nixon, victims of the flood waters which swept their home away.

An all-night deluge, totalling 14 inches in one sector, sent a placid little stream, Plum Creek, on a rampage which wrecked a Missouri-Pacific train and claimed 11 of the 12 known dead.
