Local and Other Items

THE GASFESIA arrived in port about four o'clock this afternoon.

THE WEATHER.—Moderate to fresh north and northeast winds, mostly cloudy or foggy. Thursday: fresh to strong southeast to southwest winds, unsettled, with occasional rain.

WASN'T CAREFUL ENOUGH.—In Halifax on Monday afternoon, Thomas Thompson, an employe of the Nova Scotia Telephone Company, fell from the top of one of the company's poles, and was instantly killed.

THE CRESCENTS.—At the meeting of the Crescent Cycling Club, last evening, Mr. Wendall Harvie was elected president in succession to Mr. G. O. McLeod, who resigned. It was decided to hold the annual dinner of the club at the Revere Hotel, on Monday evening next.

SCHOONER FLOATED.—The Summerside Journal reports that the schooner Pioneer, of Newfoundland, which was stranded in Cascumpec harbor, in the storm of Sunday the 27th November, was floated off last Sunday night and is now at Queen's Wharf loading oats for Benj. Rogers, for St. John's.

THE STANLEY.—The Stanley left for Picton this morning at seven o'clock, and will return tomorrow forenoon. She did not arrive till about half-past seven last night, on account of the thick weather. The horse came down Queen Street at a lively pace, and when near Stevenson's collided with a sloven and became separated from the carriage. Turning about again, the horse ran out Brighton Road and was captured near the residence of Colonel Moore. The wagon, with its load of groceries was taken in charge by the police and subsequently handed over to the owner. The countryman had to hire a carriage to take him home.

THE KINDERGARTEN.—The centre of interest, this forenoon, was Kindergarten Hall. There, in the middle of the room, were the little children, sixty in number, and about the sides an western end, standing and sitting, were the children of a larger growth, all deeply interested. On the platform was a fine Christmas tree, laden with the fruits for the season. The whole formed a very pretty picture.
