It appeals to the proud man, who would like to say that he is completely independent, completely self-determined even of God. What it does is to exalt the individual man, and make him like another god. Remember the promise of Satan: "You shall be as gods?"
WILL NOT SERVE
We remember having read in a newspaper, several years ago, a letter to the editor which contained the remarkable statement, "I always admired Adam's courage."
This person was making explicit what few realize: that the extreme "rugged individualist" is committed by Satan himself, and by our first parents; he is saying "I will not serve."
The very reason that such a philosophy is attractive to the mind, especially of one who feels himself capable of carrying it out, is that it is half right.
The most insidious kind of lie is the one which is a half-truth.
A man is a free being. He has been given a mind and will, in virtue of which he can choose what end he shall seek to attain, it. Unlike the lower creatures of God, then, a man is master of his acts. He is responsible for them. He can merit a reward by means of them. The moral struggle of a man achieving that which is difficult is a magnificent thing which demands, and rightly, our admiration.
However, God has made man in such a way that he cannot get along without His assistance—indeed, he can do nothing that will gain his reward, without the grace of God—"Without Me you can do nothing." In order to be exalted, a man must humble himself before his Maker.
The only thing man can do without God's assistance is give up the struggle. But at least this minimum is in his power, and a man engaged totally by the philosophy we have been describing may well do so. Nietzsche, at least, ended up by going mad, and committing suicide.

DOCTRINE OF SUPERMAN IGNORES DIVINE GRACE
During the latter half of the last century there lived rather remarkable philosopher named Friedrich Nietzsche. His influence on thinking men of his own time and the ensuing decades was considerable —not the least important of his disciples were the Nazis, for he was the man who invented the doctrine of the Superman.
Not that Nietzsche thought the German people was a superrace —his notion was invented by the Nazis. However, he did think that humanity found its highest and noblest expression in certain supermen, who were able to overcome all that stood in the way of their will to power, their will to create.
These supermen, according to him, were by no means limited to any one nation. They appeared only very occasionally, and they might spring from any people, in any historical epoch.

have outlined it, without the addition made by the Nazis, could well be made the creed of a strict capitalist society.
How closely the superman resembles the ideal of a selfmade man, who pits his wit and strength against those of his fellows, and rises from rags to riches and power.
How many men in our society have not striven for this very thing, especially in the days of rugged individualism, before our governments began to confer benefits upon the less fortunate members of our society.
There are still plenty of men (less than there once were, let us hope) whose view of life, whose code of morality, is precisely this. To be selfish is to act in accordance with nature.
Christian charity and benevolence is nothing more than thinly disguised weakness.
Prayer for assistance from God is weakness with no disguise at all.
Such men are in perfect agreement with Nietzsche in all the essential of his doctrine.
We have said that this doctrinal is by no means ridiculous. It is quite attractive to a certain type of man. It is really the same

Canadian Visit Impresses Scot

FREDERICTON (CP) — A distinguished educationist said Thursday night Canada has the opportunity to lead the nations of the West because of her tremendous natural resources.
Dr. Douglas M. McIntosh, director of education for Fife, Scotland told delegates to an education conference because of "the glorious opportunities which face this country" Canada must train her young people to take responsibility and leadership in the community and the world.
Dr. McIntosh contrasted Canada's position with that of his native Scotland.
In Scotland, the scene was "fraught with economic difficulties" and the danger of inflation. He said there must be an "agonizing reappraisal" of his country's position in the world today.
"We are going to stress our technical education, for we can only keep our standard of living by exporting our skills."
Some progress had been made in Scotland could claim to be the first to sell atomic power on a commercial basis.

PEMBROKE, Ont. (CP)—Fred Kruschenake, 84, hasn't time to complain about the old age pension. He's too busy baking bread.
Native of Germany and resident in Canada since 1884, he rises every day at 5 a.m. to bake his daily bread, do his washing and complete his household chores. That has been his routine since his wife died a year ago. They would have marked their 60th wedding anniversary this month.
He's usually finished baking, washing, dusting, scrubbing and waxing floors about 10 a.m. Then he spends the rest of the day in his large garden, where he grows a lot of his own food although his eyesight is faded. His hearing is still nearly perfect.
A district farmer before moving to Pembroke 11 years ago, Mr. Kruschenake is the father of 12 children.

Find Doukhobor Widow Hanged

KRESTOVA, B.C. (CP) — The body of a Doukhobor widow, Mrs. Mary Gienger, 32, was found hanging from a beam in her Krestova home Thursday night.
Nearby was a letter she had just received from her nine-year-old daughter Patsy, detained at a New Denver school. It read:
"Mommy, I am lonesome for you. . . Come and visit me. . . I love you. Goodbuy"
There are 89 children in the school in New Denver in B.C.'s Kootenay district. They are considered wards of the courts, taken when their Doukhobor parents refused to send them to school in accordance with B.C. law.

The two have formed the Nova Scotia Domestic Rabbit Distributors Limited. They said at a press conference here they aim to sell the meat both in Canada and in Europe, frozen and in cans.
The chinchilla pelt is also suitable for manufacturing ladies' coats, capes, stoles, bed rugs, slippers, mittens and other clothing.
