**Metropolitan Committee Reports Steps Necessary**

**B. FIRE SERVICES**

Regarding Fire Services, amalgamation of Charlottetown with the Villages of Parkdale and Spring Park would call for little except a reorganization of the existing Ch'Town Parkdale and Spring Park Fire Departments into 1 Metropolitan Fire Department.

The present Ch'Town Fire Department consists of a chief, 4 deputy chief, 3 captains, 5 lieutenants and 35 men, broken down into 15 officers and men constituting the ladder, company, 20 officers and men constituting the hose company, and 10 officers and men constituting the auxiliary corps.

Departmental Headquarters are located in the Charlottetown Fire Hall adjacent to City Hall and supervised by a team of 4 Engineers. These are permanent paid employees while the members of the Fire Department are volunteers. Equipment consists of 3 Pumpers, 1 Service Truck and 1 Ladder Truck.

An air horn atop the Fire Hall sounds general alarms and is augmented by a system of telephone alarm boxes connected to the station which ring in the firemen's individual homes. Auxiliary corps members are required to service General Alarms only, and provide a training field from which is drawn recruits for the regular force as vacancies occur.

There is a 10,000 gallon water tank located under the Parkdale Fire Hall which provides an additional water supply available for fires in the more thickly built-up central portion of the Village. Alarms are sounded via a siren located on top the Fire Hall and an informal Telephone System is used as between members of the Fire Department to augment the siren in notifying each other of fires within the Village.

On the other hand Spring Park has a Chief, a Deputy Chief, an engineer, 9 regular firemen and 8 auxiliary ones. Equipment includes 1 Pumper equipped with ladders etc. and a truck with 1000 gallon tank capacity. Alarms are sounded by a siren atop the Fire Hall in Spring Park which can be sounded from the Charlottetown Fire Hall.

Costs of operating these 3 Departments ran last year to \$17,356.81 for Charlottetown, and approximately \$1500.00 in each of the Villages. A considerable portion of the \$1500.00 however went for new equipment in both Parkdale and Spring Park.

It is to be remembered that 95 per cent of the Spring Park Firemen work in Charlottetown, with the situation re the Parkdale Firemen being similar - so the alarm system by day in both Spring Park and Parkdale is not too effective and leaves much to be desired. In practice, however, all departments in reality even now act together on a sort of metropolitan basis and call on each other for any sort of major fire within the metropolitan area.

At the present time there is no special Provincial Government grant to the Villages of Parkdale or Spring Park in regards to fire equipment or protection other than the overall general village grants.

The big saving that would come about through amalgamation would be mainly that of the saving to the residents of Parkdale and Spring

Recently Charlottetown has purchased and is awaiting early delivery of a new Pierre Thebault Pumper and with its acquisition, together with the hereafter mentioned present equipment of Parkdale and Spring Park, the amalgamated re-organized Metropolitan Fire Department would be amply equipped for the task of fire fighting in the whole metropolitan area.

While the present city alarm system does not lend itself to being extended into the Parkdale and Spring Park areas, yet it is to be remembered that such system is in itself outmoded and needs to be brought up to date shortly in any event. A newer, more modern alarm system could easily be installed to cover Parkdale and Spring Park at very little additional cost over and above that necessary anyway for the Charlottetown installation.

Parkdale presently has a chief, 2 lieutenants and 13 men. Equipment consists of 1 - 1500 weight Army Truck with 500 gallon tank mounted thereon, 1 - 50 G.P.M. Pumper attached and 1 - 1950 truck rigged up to carry hose and other fire equipment. All firemen

are volunteers.

C. Streets and Street Services. Some statistics may be in order at the start of consideration of this aspect of amalgamation.

**STREETS**

At the present time there are some 30 miles of streets in the City of Charlottetown, 8 miles in Parkdale and 6 miles in Spring Park. These are broken down as follows:-

Charlottetown: 20 miles heavy pavement, 6 miles of light pavement and 4 miles of gravel and clay streets;

Parkdale: 3 miles heavy pavement, 4 miles of light pavement and 1 mile of gravel and clay streets.

Spring Park: 2 1/2 miles of heavy pavement, one-half mile of light pavement and 3 miles of gravel (Continued on Page 14)
