NEW YORK, July 22—Corporate reports this morning are generally better than those for the same period of 1935. American Brake Shoe and Foundry earnings per share for the 6 months amounted to \$1.26 against 72 cents in 1935. Favorable business news this morning includes American Petroleum Institute report of a reduction of over 500,000 barrels in to-

tal gasoline stock in the week ending July 18. Dividend meetings today include Armstrong Cork, Fairbanks Morse, Ingersoll Rand, Liggett and Meyers and Phillips Petroleum. Subject to slight correction believe the market will go higher and would favor the steels, coppers, Atchison, Southern Pacific, New York Central, North American, General Electric, Allis Chalmers, Continental Can and Standard Oil of New Jersey.

NEW YORK, July 22—Leading foreign currencies continued under pressure today.

In addition to the Spanish situation, which further depressed the peseta despite official control measures, there were increased offerings of gold block currencies from the continent. The French franc lost .00 5-8 of a cent, Dutch guilders yielded .02 of a cent and Swiss francs dropped .03 1-2 of a cent. The pound sterling lost 1-4 of a cent.

The Japanese yen steadied following the reopening of markets in Tokyo which were closed following rumors of an impending change in the exchange setup. The unit closed .02 of a cent higher. Dealings were light.

MONTREAL, July 22—Leading currencies declined narrowly on Montreal foreign exchanges today. Pound sterling lost 1-8 cent, at \$2.02 1-16 while the French franc eased .01 cent to 6.82 cents. The United States dollar was even at 1-16 premium.

MINING

TORONTO, July 22—Mining shares continued their advance today on the Toronto stock exchange with several issues posting new high records in the good action. Gold and miscellaneous indices each added a point.

Medium priced goods were featured with Hard Rock rising 30 cents to close at 3.25 after touching a new peak of 3.29. Chromium found its best display since being listed with a 17 cent gain to 2.45 and O'Brien, Bigdoo Kirkland, McWaters, Canadian Malartic and Beattie were substantially higher. Central Patricia touched a peak of 4.90 but finished at 4.65 and God's Lake, Argosy and San Antonio lost a few cents.

Read Authier dropped 20 to 3.80. Anglo-Huronian moved up to 6.00 a new top and a gain of 50. East Malartic led the penny section with a 6 cent addition to 86 and Armitfield, Ashley and Sladen were better. Minto and Central Manitoba were soft.

Bear, Nipissing and Waite Amulet improved in the silvers as did Ventures, Sherritt and Mandy among base metals. Noranda fell to 62, though and Falconbridge was down. Oils were firmer.

Dome, Little Long Lac and Pioneer strengthened in the big golds, but Barlone and Tech-Hughes were lower and McIntyre and Lake Shore unchanged.

MONTREAL, July 22—Potato prices firmed slightly on Montreal open produce markets today while butter, cheese and eggs were steady in light trading.

New Quebec potatoes were quoted at \$1.25 to \$1.35 cents per 80 pound bag.

Cheese averaged 13 1-2 to 3-4 cents per pound for Ontario white and colored while Quebecs were unquoted.

Butter was quoted at 22 5-8 cents per pound for carlots or less of no 1 while lots to retailers were 24 1-2 for solids and 25 for prints.

Graded egg shipments in carlots or less were quoted at 24 to 25 cents a dozen for A large, 22 to 23 for A medium, 21 to 22 for C.

WINNIPEG, July 22—Wheat futures prices continued to sag on Winnipeg grain exchange today as liberal selling broke through thin support.

Values closed 3-4 to 3-8 cent lower, with July at 92 3-4, October 92 1-4 to 1-2 and December at 91 5-8 cents a bushel.

Export business was placed at 500,000 bushels.

The market scored fractional opening gains, but support weakened and liberal selling for New York and southern account carried values downward to losses amounting to two cents at the low points in late trading. Short-covering initiated recovery near the close.

Moderate demand for the top grades continued in cash wheat, with 1, 2 and 3 northern enquired after. Business in durums was also in evidence.

Most coarse grains futures closed higher, with good buying credited to domestic interests appearing in July oats.

Cultural Relic

Found At Papua

CANBERRA, Australia, July 20—(CP)—Relics of a culture believed introduced from western lands thousands of years ago have been discovered on the Trobriand Islands, at Papua. Formations of stones reassembled a miniature Stonehenge and indicated existence of cult practices in the long ago.

Formations of grey and white stones, 17 feet high and six feet broad, were laid out in orderly fashion. Many were arranged in rectangles thought to have been sacred places devoted to cult practices, tomb temples and privileged burial places. Discovery was made by P. E. Williams, Australian government anthropologist.

It was estimated some of the rocks weighed in the neighborhood of 12,000 pounds. Task of erecting the builders presented great difficulties. In addition to their great weight they were fragile, which made transportation over long distances a problem. An excavation near one of the formations revealed fragments of human bones, pottery and pig tusks.
