'No Permanent Peace' Seen In Steel Industry

HOFFMAN WASHINGTON (AP) — Declaring it will not be beaten, the Steelworkers union said Monday a court order may force an 80-day truce in the steel strike "but there will be no permanent peace." Steelworkers president David J. McDonald told a White House fact-finding panel that at the end of the enforce truce the basic issue would remain unresolved. The basic issue, he said, is "whether the companies will break the union."

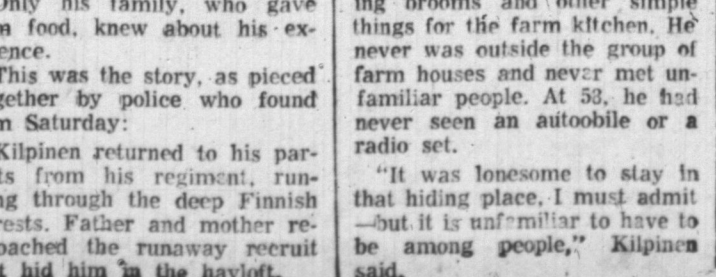
