The action was taken after a series of political moves in the last two days, climaxed by a declaration by the Turkish foreign minister in Ankara Friday that Turkey may find it necessary to intervene in the Greek-Turkish dispute in Cyprus.
Rumors swept through Nicosia that Turkey had assembled six ships off the northern coast of Cyprus. At the same time Cyprus sources said the U.S. Sixth Fleet was hovering somewhere near the area, as it often does.
The British forces, who have been here longer than any other units in the United Nations contingent, restricted their men to barracks in Nicosia, Limassol and Larnaca. Cyprus is a small island.

Leitch Mines Claim Portion Of New Find

TORONTO (CP) - Leitch Gold Mines Ltd. and Mastodon-Highland Bell Mines Ltd. have filed a writ in the Supreme Court of Ontario Friday that they hold mineral rights on part of the land on which Texas Gulf is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Highland-Bell Ltd.
Announcement of the writ was made Friday after the close of the Toronto Stock Exchange.
The companies said that under the agreement a section of the land surveyed by Texas Gulf referred to as Area 3 was held by the company "as trustee for the plaintiffs under the said agreement."
The firm is therefore holding "any and all lands, claims and mineral rights and interests therein and rights thereto heretofore or hereafter acquired by or on behalf of the defendant," the writ stated.
The writ requests damages for breach of contract by Texas Gulf and an injunction restraining Texas Gulf from further damages.
Officials of both Mastodon-Highland and Bell said they have claimed a tight ring of secrecy around the affair, removed for days in Canada's financial community. Offices of both firms have issued a polite "I'm sorry but he's out of town" when calls from news media to executives are placed.
No estimates is given in the writ of the amount of land affected by the claim, nor its value. Texas Gulf announced the discovery April 6 of a 25,000,000-ton copper-silver-lead orebody which lies mainly in Kidd Township, 15 miles north of Timmins, Ont.
