

CORONER'S INQUEST.—An Inquest was held yesterday, at Lot 33, on the view of the body of Mr. Adam Bell, Farmer, Brackley Point Road. From the evidence taken before the Coroner, it appears that the deceased was returning home the previous evening, in company with 8 or 10 of his neighbours, who had been assisting to stump a field, when a tree was thrown down by the violence of the wind, and fell amongst the party, striking Bell on the head, and fracturing his skull. The deceased was killed on the spot.—Verdict accordingly.

SHIP NEWS.

The Brigantine Eliza, of Quebec,—Terran, Master and owner, sailed from London for Quebec, on the 2d Sept. On the morning of the 18th ult. the Eliza struck, on the S. E. end of the Island of Anticosti, the wind blowing very fresh, and a heavy surf breaking over the vessel. About 24 hours after the vessel struck, she slid off the rocks into deep water, and sunk immediately. Two seamen, and a passenger named Tontou, were drowned. The Captain and remainder of the crew succeeded in reaching the shore, and from thence proceeded to the nearest provision station, about 20 miles distant, where they obtained shelter and refreshment. After remaining there a day or two, they were taken off by a small fishing vessel, and carried into Miramichi.

Lighthouse at Louisbourg, Cape Breton.

THE Commissioners of Light Houses give notice, that a NEW LIGHT HOUSE has been erected, where the Beacon stood, on the Site of the old French Light, on the East side of the entrance of the Harbour of Louisbourg, in Latitude 45° 54' N. Longitude 59° 50' West, and exhibits a plain white Light, visible, on the Seaward side, from Garbarus point, Westward, to the South Eastern extremity of Cape Breton, Easterly. The Lantern is 85 feet above the Sea level, is placed on a square Building about sixty fathoms from the shore, painted white, with a perpendicular black stripe on each side, to distinguish it from other Light Houses in day time, and to render it conspicuous in Winter, when the back land is covered with Snow. The Keeper resides in the Light House. The following remarks may assist Vessels bound for the harbour. Vessels from the Eastward intending to make the harbour, should bring the Light to bear West by North, or more Northerly, before they run for it; coming from the Westward, it should bear North by East, or as much more Northerly as you please, to clear Green Island and ledges, which lie about 3/4 of a mile South by West, 1/2 West, from the Light—When in the entrance (which is near half a mile wide), and the Light bearing N. N. E. distance 2 or 300 fathoms, steer West N. W. half a mile, to avoid "Nags head," a sunken rock, on the starboard hand, bearing W. by N. 1/2 N. from the Light. The N.
