

Old Picture-Rock Carvings Found

PETERBOROUGH, Ont. (CP)—What are believed to be pre-historic Indian picture-rock carvings more than 50 in number, have been found 30 miles northeast of here.

Vice-president Ernest Craig, geologist Charles Phillips and workman Everitt Davis, all of American Nepheline Mines, made the discovery.

Royal Ontario Museum archeologists, who will examine the find said the carvings may be very rare. They probably pre-date the arrival of the first white man Samuel de Champlain in 1608, and are likely of Algonquin origin.

By STANLEY FRIDDLE GENEVA, (Reuters) — "Some progress" was reported Monday at a three-hour and 15 minute meeting of nine powers trying to end the Indo-China war, another session is scheduled for today.

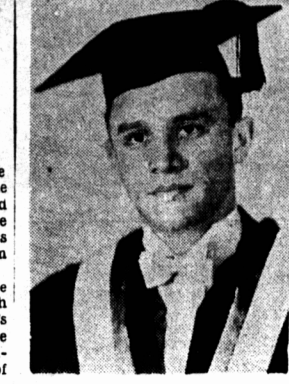

Some Progress Reported At Geneva Talks

By STANLEY FRIDDLE GENEVA, (Reuters) — "Some progress" was reported Monday at a three-hour and 15 minute meeting of nine powers trying to end the Indo-China war, another session is scheduled for today.

Authoritative sources said the conference "had a useful discussion on restoring peace and made some progress."

However, no agreement was reached on the dispute over evacuating French Union wounded from the captured northern Indo-China port of Dien Bien Phu.

And the Communists clung to their demand that Laos and Cambodia—the smaller of the three associated Indo-Chinese states—must be included in any peace settlement.

The West holds that Laos and Cambodia cannot be put on the same basis as Viet Nam, main battleground of the war, because they are threatened with external aggression while the war in Viet Nam is being carried on by rebels.

The value of an article didn't lie entirely in the article itself. Have you ever bought a foreign radio when it went wrong and to scrap it because you could not buy a simple replacement part? Have you faced such a difficulty with an imported car, or imported machinery?

Nevertheless, it was the responsibility of Canadian manufacturers to see that their prices and quality were right.

Women were the big buyers, and we have to prove to them that Canadian-made articles are the best they can get for the price they can pay, and that their individual prosperity depends upon buying "made-in-Canada" goods.

When Canadian manufacturers asked for so-called protection, Mr. Ferguson stated, they were asking it only for basic national industries, "those upon which our other industries depend."

For all other industries, the Canadian manufacturer asked no more than fair conditions of competition. Heal decisions for later. However, details of the plan were not made public.

The meeting Monday was a restricted session in that no press briefings were held and delegation heads were permitted only three advisers each.
