Russians Seem Bent On Exploiting Vodka Parties

Associated Press News Analyst NEW YORK (AP) — Almost any day can turn out to be V-Day — vodka, that is — in Moscow.

And whenever Nikita Khrushchev and his boys get a little carefree, foreign correspondents whip out notebooks and wait for diplomatic history to unfold.

Some are even beginning to wonder whether Khrushchev will drink too much once too often and suddenly be unloaded as the boss of world communism, but it's not likely. Drinking or sober, the leader of world communism seem to know what they're about.

Serious, two-fisted drinking among Russian leaders is nothing new. Moscow has a chilly climate and vodka has a way of sending a warm tingle through the veins.

The big difference today is that the leaders are taking it in their stride. At least a dozen times in its brief reign, the new 'collective leadership has shown its ability to demolish huge stocks of vodka collectively. Each time it has made news.

Garden parties, banquets, receptions roll by in a crescendo of conviviality. One gets the impression that the Russian leadership will present themselves to the outside world as human beings or paralyze themselves in the attempt.

The first time Western correspondents were privileged to see the Soviet leaders bending elbows with reckless abandon was in November, 1953. This correspondent was there, and got the idea that the boys were letting off steam, celebrating the passing of Stalin, and historically the Russians are not teetotalers and have a special attitude toward drinking.

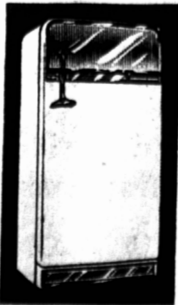

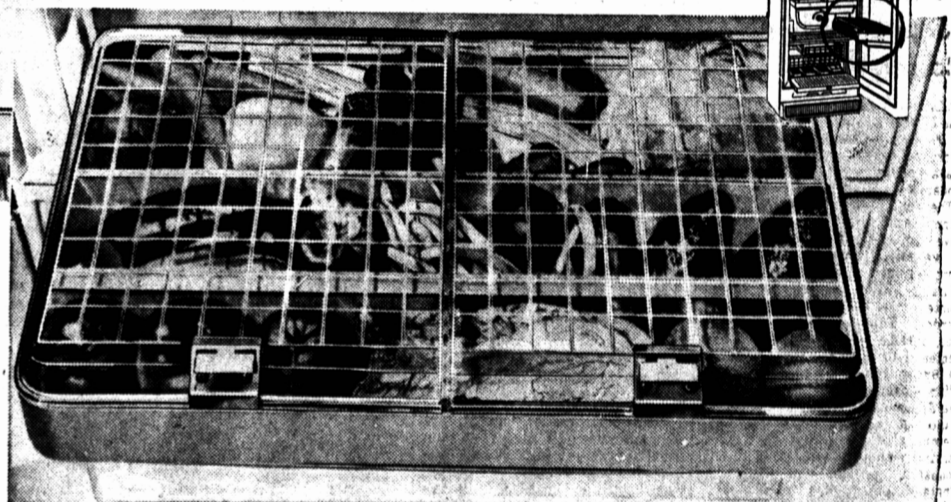

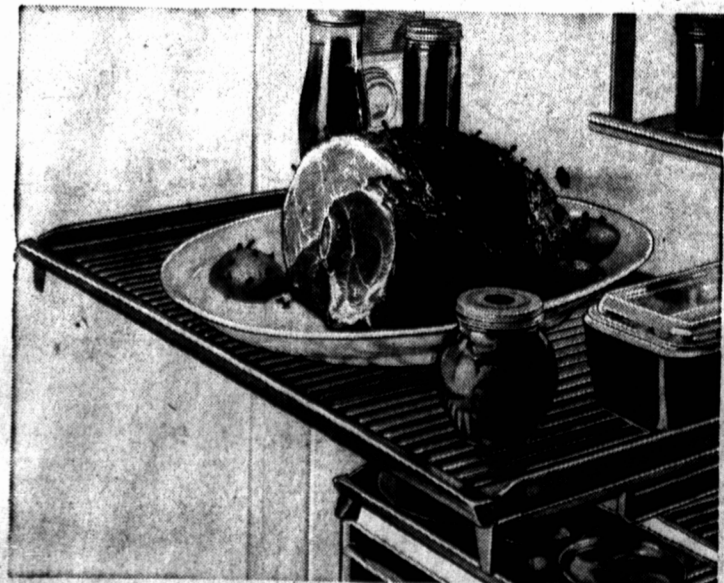
